## DEATH OF SAMUEL BUTLER.

Passed Away at a Ripe Old Age—Long Identified With Marysville.

The death occurred at Douglas yesterday afternoon of a well known and highly respected resident of York County in the person of Samuel Butler. The deceased has been suffering for some time with the infirmities due to old age, having passed his 82nd year, and his death was not unexpected although he has only been seriously ill for the past two weeks.

Mr. Butler was a native of St. Stephen where for some years he successfully carried on the business of a contractor and builder. Shortly after Alexander Gibson started up in Marysville, he moved there, where he resided for upwards of twenty years. He superintended the building of the cotton mill, the Methodist church, and many of the houses in the city, which structures are standing today to testify to his workmanship. Since removing from Marysville Mr. Butler has been living with his children, of whom he leaves seven, three daughters and four sons to mourn the loss of a kind and dutiful father. The children are: Mrs. Stephen Carlisle of Douglas, with whom he resided, Mrs. Lyon of Boston, Mrs. Oscar Boone of Montana, and four sons, W. H., the well known contractor of Gibson, T. W., of St. Stephen, John, of Boston and S. N., of Montana. There are also two daughters a dead, Mrs. John Gilman of Kingsclear, and Mrs. Andrew Wandlass of Boston.

Deceased had been a widower for a period of twenty three years.

The funeral will take place on Thursday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock from the residence of Mrs. Carlisle, Douglas, Rev. J. J. Colter officiating. Interment will be made in the Methodist cemetery at Marysville, John G. Adams having charge of arrangements.
