

MASSIE'S GOOD WORK

Made a Clean Sweep of
First Prizes at the Y.
C. R. A. Matches

HELD AT THE STANLEY RANGE
ON FRIDAY.

Won Three Cups and a Silver
Medal.

HAVING TAKEN THE VANWART CUP
TWICE IT NOW BECOMES HIS
PROPERTY.

The annual prize meeting of the York County Rifle Association took place on the Stanley range Friday and was one of the most successful in the history of the organization. There were forty competitors in attendance, fifteen of whom were from this city. The weather was all that could be desired, and the scoring was above the average. A light tricky wind prevailed for the greater part of the day, and the light was not as good as it might have been, consequently some of the younger shots found it difficult to connect with the bull's eye as often as they would have liked.

A. E. Massie, of this city, who last year astonished the Stanleyists by walking off with the first prize in both matches, did the trick again this year with a substantial lead on the next highest competitor. He won the Elder Cup and P. R. A. in the first competition, and also captured the Vanwart cup, which having been won twice now becomes his property. This trophy was donated by the late Wesley Vanwart during his occupancy of the Mayor's chair and of course cannot be renewed.

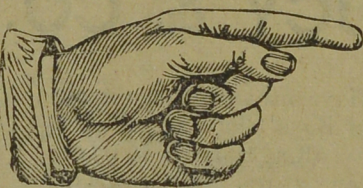
