

CURED BY X-RAYS.

Dr. Hanson. Formerly of This City. Has Made a Wonderful Discovery.

A Butte, Montana, despatch of recent date says:

"What is believed by physicians to be a most remarkable scientific discovery was made in the case of Dr. H. A. Cayley, the alleged victim of Editor J. W. Kelly, of the Inter-Mountain. Cayley, since the shooting, a week ago, has been in a continued state of paralysis, with the physicians expecting death momentarily. The bullet was supposed to have lodged near the spinal cord and all hope of recovery had been given up.

Last night it was determined to perform an operation and an X-Ray apparatus was secured with a view of locating the leaden missile. The bullet in its downward course had absolutely destroyed the nerves of the stomach, pelvic organ and lower extremities and this was supposed to make recovery absolutely impossible. The victim was subjected to the rays of the machine for twenty-five minutes, when to the astonishment of all the wounded man declared loudly the X-Ray had cured him. To increase their great surprise the doctors found the paralysis had wholly left their patient and that the movements of his body were unrestricted. Cayley had been completely paralyzed below the chest.

Dr. Hanson late last night made the announcement he firmly believed that in the treatment of Cayley with the X-Ray he has made a wonderful discovery, which will be of incalculable value to the medical fraternity. No recent case has elicited so much interest and today, more than a week after the shooting occurred, the interest is unabated."

The Dr. Hanson mentioned as having made the wonderful discovery is Dr. Havelock H. Hanson, eldest son of Mr. Edgar Hanson of this city and brother in law of Mr. Havelock Coy of this city.

A MODERN CAFE.

Something About Prof. Washington's New Establishment.

The new cafe opened yesterday by Prof. Washington in the Edgemoor block, York Street, fills a long felt want in this city and should have a liberal patronage. The professor's place of business is located four doors from King street and was fitted up specially for his use. A large plate glass front has been put in, and the interior has been made very attractive by the addition of a steel ceiling, of splendid design and handsomely tinted. The floor has been covered with linoleum and carpet, and bright and attractive paintings adorn the walls. There are no stalls, such as are found in other restaurants in the city, marble topped tables, large enough for four persons, being used instead.

Prof. Washington has had twenty-six years experience in the restaurant business and is thoroughly conversant with the needs of the public in his line. It is his intention to serve a full course dinner daily from twelve to three o'clock, and lunches, ordered from a printed bill of fare, may be obtained at all hours. Cleanliness is the professor's motto, and it will be his aim to give every satisfaction to his patrons.

The professor will also serve oysters in all the popular styles, and ice cream will be one of his specialties. It is his intention to manufacture the latter by electricity, and he claims that a much better article can be turned out by that method. All orders for large or small quantities will be promptly filled.

In Prof. Washington's establishment the city possesses a first class modern cafe and it is to be hoped that the enterprise shown by the proprietor will be appreciated by the public. It is the intention of the professor in the near future to open a parlor on the first floor over his cafe.

Two Western Churches After Rev. Geo. M. Campbell.

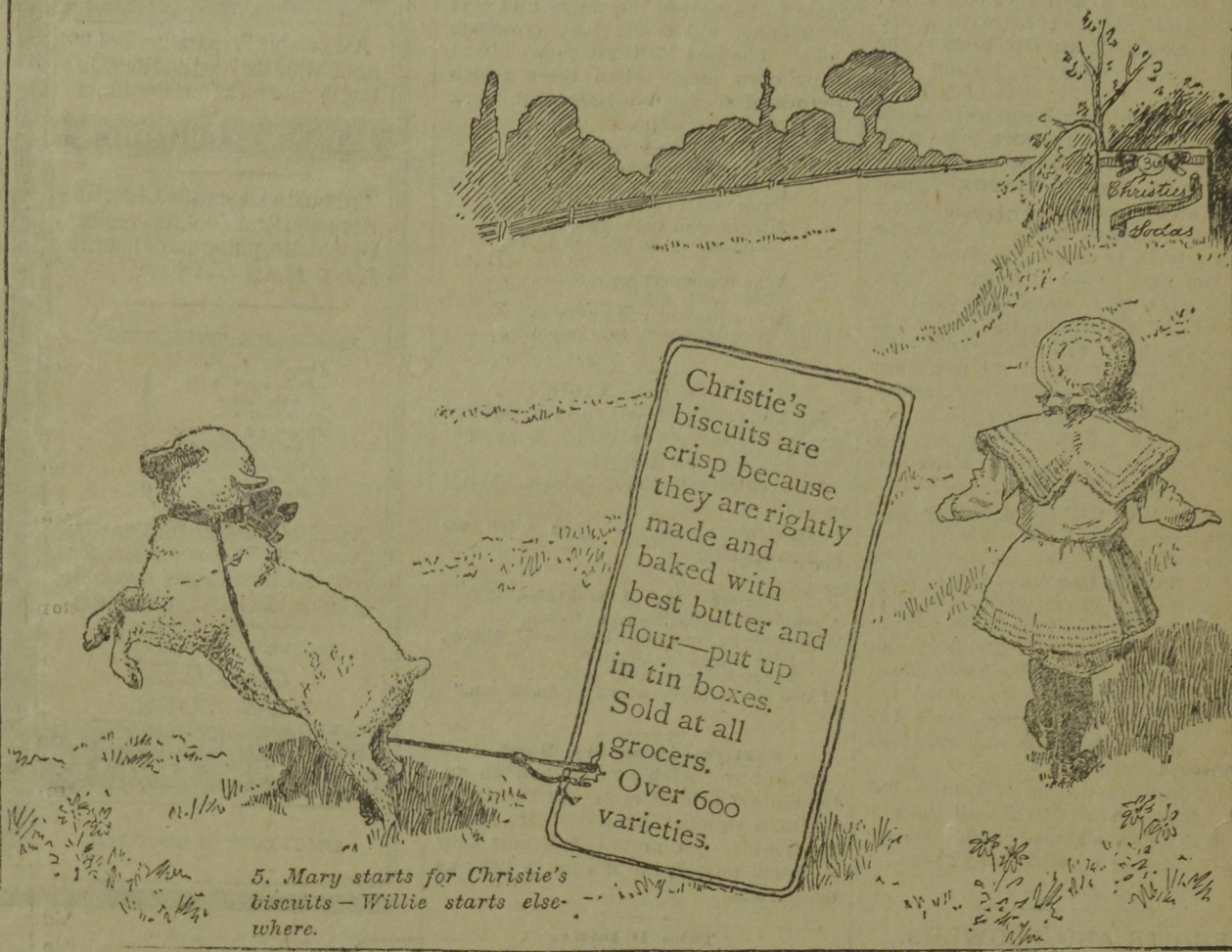
