SATISFACTION FOR MR. TARTE.

The Minister of Public Works in spite of the stiff blows he is receiving from the Toronto Globe, must be experiencing some satisfaction from the splendid endorsement he is receiving from his former enemies of the Tory press. During the campaign of 1900, Mr. Tarte was denounced from one end of the country as a dangerous man, one who was seeking to snap the ties which bind Canada to the mother land and anxious to plant the banner of France in this country, as having opposed the despatch of Canadian soldiers to South Africa, and as a reckless spendthrift who was driving Canada into financial ruin and beggary. One ardent Tory spouter in New Brunswick even suggested that as a result of Mr. Tarte's alleged anti-British campaign it might be necessary for our soldiers to march on Quebec and reconquer the French Canadians. All this of course was to arouse a feeling against the government, to scare the electors into supporting the Tory party, and it worked admirably, but not to the extent its promoters hoped. No doubt, as the Toronto Globe has intimated, many constituencies in Ontario were lost to the government because of the cry against Mr. Tarte, and right here in York the Tory candidate profited largely from the anti-Tarte campaign.

Now what do we find in the short space of two years. This, that the Tory newspapers have turned to eulogizing Mr. Tarte as the most important, most progressive and most popular member of the government, because the minister has been playing to the high protectionists in recent addresses. Tarte in 1900 was a double dyed traitor according to the Tory stumpers and Tory press; Tarte today in the same newspapers is being held up as a paragon of perfection, a man that cannot be spared from the government, a patriot with the purest motives.

Need we quote instances of the new found Tory zeal on Mr. Tarte's behalf. Here is a gem from the Ottawa citizen, a Tory of the Tories. Our contemporary which hounded Mr. Tarte with all the force it could command up to within a few weeks ago now says:

"The one shining exception in this aggregation of inability has been Hon. J. Israel Tarte, the Minister of Public Works. His personal energy and untiring industry; his alertness to opportunity and expressed desire that the country should profit by it; his aggressive Canadianism and practical views on transportation and tariff questions—in a word, the permeating influence of his progressive personality has done much to sustain public confidence in the Administration by at least holding out promise that eventually his views would prevail, and the Government would develop a policy on broad national lines and do something with the splendid resources at its command to further such a policy."

We say Mr. Tarte must derive some satisfaction from utterances of this kind in view of the wicked way in which he was formerly denounced in the Tory press, but it is doubtful if so astute a man as the minister of public works can be flattered into total insensibility to the methods that were used against him while he and the government of which he is a member were engaged in a political life and death struggle before the electors of Canada less than two years ago.

HISTORY RECALLED.

Conservatives who are finding satisfaction in the tariff disputes between Mr. Tarte on the one side and Mr. Sifton and

the Toronto Globe on the other, would do well to recall incidents which occurred just previous to the federal elections of 1900, when their party were putting forward that wonderful triumvirate of politicians, Tupper, Hugh John Macdonald and Foster as the Moses to lead the country out of the wilderness into the sweet pastures of power and patronage at Ottawa. These three worthy but much overestimated gentlemen made a tour of the upper provinces together, and of course while speaking from the same platform were compelled to be as one on the tariff question, they were all for high protection, at Montreal, Toronto and in the other populous centres where they delivered addresses, but as soon as they became separated in the campaign, one going to one province and another to another, their speeches showed a wide divergence on the tariff question.

Sir Charles Tupper stumped extensively in Quebec, and at a meeting in Montreal made an effort to rally the old defenders of the national policy. He declared that "the policy of the Conservative party is the same policy that in 1879 was placed upon the statute books of Canada—fitting protection to every Canadian industry and to Canadian labor."

Mr. Foster, who was addressing meetings in other large industrial centres made similar declarations, but not so Hugh John Macdonald, who had cut clear of association with Tupper and Foster, and gone to Brandon where he was engaged in a vigorous fight to defeat Mr. Sifton, broke away from the high protection idea. The farmers of the west were clamoring for a reduction of the duties on agricultural implements and Hugh John found it popular to talk tariff reduction. Speaking at Brandon he declared that "if elected a representative of Brandon he would pledge himself to use whatever influence he had to have the entire duty removed from agricultural implements. This was a distinct pledge, and he said he intended to carry it out. He also said that when combines were formed to raise the price of any article beyond the proper price, he was prepared, although a firm believer in a protective tariff, to remove that protection and force the combine to meet the open competition of the world."

Mr. Macdonald carried this cry all through the West so that the unusual spectacle was witnessed of the leader of a party in one part of the country maintaining that if returned to power, he would uphold the high protection afforded by the national policy, while one of his chief lieutenants was promising the people free trade in certain lines of goods consumed in great quantities in the West.

These were tariff differences which our Conservative friends choose now to forget, while they smile encouragingly at the lively discussions in which Mr. Tarte, Mr. Sifton and the Toronto Globe have indulged.

Mr. Henry F. McLatchey, who is announced as a government candidate in Restigouche, as running mate to Hon. C. H. LaBillois, is a well known and popular lawyer of Campbellton, a Liberal, and a gentleman, who will bring great strength to the ticket. The chief commissioner and Mr. McLatchey will have the support of Mr. Reid, M. P., who carried the county in 1900 by a majority of 500 over Mr. McAllister, the professional partner of Mr. Mott. LaBillois and McLatchey will beat any combination the opposition can put in the field.

Affairs in the St. John murder trial have taken a new turn. Higgins, who is on trial for the murder of Doherty, went on the stand and swore that Goodspeed, the chief crown witness, is the murderer. Goodspeed and Higgins are each swearing the other's life away, and unless some strong corroborative evidence is offered in support of one story or the other the jury will have a difficult task to perform in arriving at a true verdict.

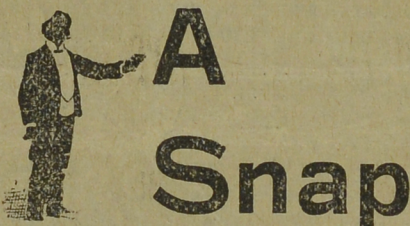

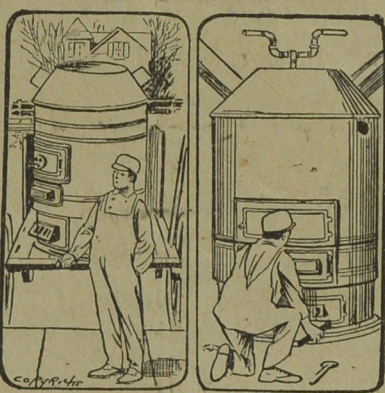

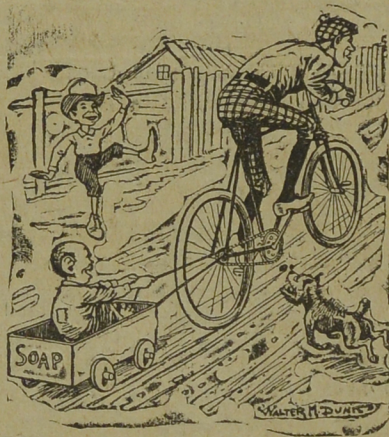
