A SPLENDID SHOWING.

Revised Figures of I. C. R. Earnings Show a Surplus of Nearly \$100,000.

Ottawa, Sept. 21.—Hon. A. G. Blair has returned from England. The minister of railways is looking exceedingly well after his trip, and is in the very best of health.

Asked by your correspondent as to his views on the fast line project, he said that he had nothing to add to what he had already said on the subject.

"The whole situation," added Mr. Blair, "will be discussed at the full meeting of the cabinet after the return of the premier, and until then nothing will be known. That is how the matter now stands."

"Anything new about the Intercolonial?"

"Yes, I have just seen the revised figures for the year. They are better than at first given out. When leaving for England, I told you that the surplus was to be \$87,000 for the year ending June 30 last. The revised figures have been handed to me and the net surplus is \$96,880, or more than \$9,000 better than the unrevised figures showed."

"Is there a large increase in the business of the road during the past year?"

"There was about three-quarters of a million of an increase. In fact the traffic of the road has been ahead yearly at a rapid rate, and today is has \$3,000,000 greater than under the late government."

"In other words, the total increase is as large as the entire business of the road was during any of the 15 years previous under the Conservative regime."

"Will the increase be maintained during the current year?"

It looks as if it would. The figures for the two months of the current fiscal year, that is for July and August, show an increase of \$180,000 over the same two months last year. If this is maintained that would give an increase of more than \$1,000,000 for the year."

From the above figures it is plain that those who adversely criticize the Intercolonial have got a very difficult contract on hand.

FRICTION IN AUSTRALIA.

Federal and Local Governments at Odds

London, Sept. 26.—In a despatch from Sydney, N. S. J. Lyne, Minister for Home Affairs of the Commonwealth, to the possession of Dames Point, in Sydney Harbor, for purposes of national defence.

The Premier of New South Wales, Sir John See, has refused to hand over this site to the Commonwealth, and Sir W. J. Lyne has declared that the military will take possession of it. To this the Premier of New South Wales retorted that if they did so he would send policemen to arrest the soldiers.

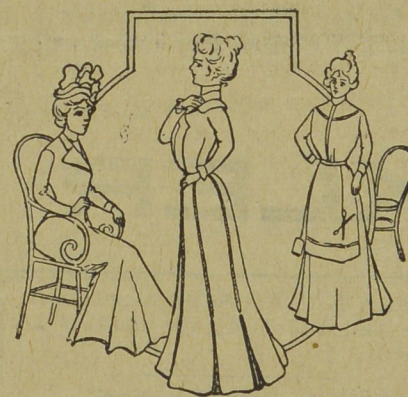
