Had No Luck.

To Hunt Moose.

BROOME—ROE.

Charming Nuptials at Christ Church
Cathedral This Afternoon.

Christ Church Cathedral was well filled with spectators at 3.45 this afternoon to witness the marriage of Rev. Edmund Broome, M. A., vicar of Hurst, Berkshire, England, to Miss Margaret Harcourt Roe, daughter of Mr. Harcourt Roe of Netley Abbey, Hampshire, England. The ceremony was performed by Right Rev. H. T. Kingdon, Lord Bishop of the diocese, and an old personal friend of the bridegroom. Prof. Saunders presided at the organ and the full choir was present and rendered several appropriate selections including "The Voice that Breathed O'er Eden."

The wedding though naturally a very quiet one, was one of the prettiest seen here for several months, and the fact that all the parties were entire strangers in the community seemed to lend additional interest to the affair. The bride was charmingly attired in a costume of oriental cream lace over silk, with hat of chiffon tulle and carried a shower bouquet. She was attended by her sister Miss Harcourt Roe, who was costumed in white and mauve. Mr. Frank Roe, a brother of the bride, was the bridegroom's best man. The bride's father gave her in marriage and her mother was also present at the ceremony.

After partaking of luncheon at the home of the Misses Allen, Waterloo Row, the happy couple will take passage by the 6.10 train on a trip to Montreal, Toronto and Niagara Falls. They are to sail from Montreal for England on October 4th.

The bride will wear for a travelling costume a dress of blue material trimmed with white silk and black velvet.

Rev. Mr. Broome is the esteemed vicar of one of the oldest and best known churches in England, and a hearty welcome awaits him and his charming bride when they return to their future home across the Atlantic. The bride was the recipient of many valuable presents from friends in England.

SALE OF LOGS.

A Quantity Belonging to Hale and
Murchie Sold at Good Prices.

A quantity of logs, belonging to the late firm of Hale & Murchie, were sold at public auction in front of the Court house this morning by direction of the St. John River Log Driving Company, which held a claim against them for tolls for 1901 and also the present season. Among those present at the sale were J. Fraser Gregory of St. John, representing the company, Henry Hilyard, J. R. McConnell, A. H. F. Randolph, Donald Fraser Jr., Parker Glasier, M. P. P., and Fred D. Miles. The spruce logs consisting of 79,036 feet of merchantable, and 1,287 feet of condemned, were bid in by J. R. McConnell for \$11.05 per thousand, to be delivered at Fredericton. The pine consisting of 2,340 feet was knocked down to Henry Hilyard at \$7.75 per thousand. In addition to the above a quantity of Hale & Murchie's lumber rafted from the drift drive and now held by James Holly & Sons of St. John, was also sold on account of default in the payment of charges. The spruce of which there was 17,084 of merchantable and 488 feet of condemned went to Mr. Hilyard at \$11.75 and he also bid in the 2,306 feet of pine at \$7.50.

Prior to the commencement of the sale Mr. Gregory announced that his company would guarantee to the purchasers the title to the lumber. H. G. C. Wetmore officiated as auctioneer.

ST. MARYS BAZAAR.

The new church basement at St. Marys is being fixed up for the bazaar which will be opened there tomorrow afternoon. The quarters are admirably adapted for the purpose, the main room being 40x75 feet in size with two smaller rooms, 16x16, which are afterwards to be used as vestries. Though the church proper has not been erected the basement is completed and is covered with a temporary roof. The place was lighted up for the first time last Saturday evening and presented a fine appearance. Tables and counters are being put in and the place is being tastefully decorated for the big event of Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

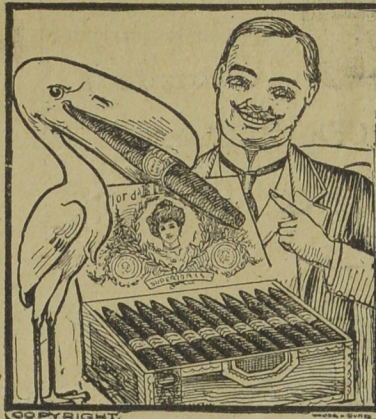
