

PRINCIPAL CAVAN.

Interesting Resume of His Fifty Years' Ministry in Canada, Including Those as Head of Knox College.

Among the fathers of Presbyterian confederation, that pact of 1875 which gave such strength and vitality to Presbyterianism in Canada, enabling it to go forward courageously to its great work in the west, Principal Cavan stands supreme. He was Moderator of the General Assembly in that historic year. He has seen most of the leaders of the church of those days fall in the path of duty. Within the past few months almost the death of such men as Grant and Robertson has emphasized the fact that a new generation must take up the work of the fathers.

It was with feelings of especial thankfulness for the sparing of Principal Cavan as an active and dominant force in the probity of the church, that his friends celebrated the 50th anniversary of the ordination of Principal Cavan by a banquet in his honor at Knox College the other night. In reply to the toast of his health, he said in part:

Of course, Mr. Chairman and gentlemen, you do not expect me to review my life to-night or to attempt anything like an autobiography. That would be, I am afraid, a very tedious proceeding for this evening and not very profitable or instructive. The Chairman has stated that I began my ministry in the little town of St. Mary's. I did so exactly 50 years ago, and was received by a kind people in a very new part of the country and at a time when things were not advanced as they are at the present day. St. Mary's was lodged in the wilderness. The roads which I had to travel around about it were very often blazed roads. I had two congregations, six miles apart, and the greater part of the way was through the woods. The young generation here do not know what a blazed road is, and I need not take the time to explain it. The people were very kind to me, and it is most interesting to me to think now of the appearance which my congregation presented when they were dismissed on the Lord's Day. In five minutes the woods had swallowed them up, and I saw nothing more of them until the next Sabbath.

After serving about fourteen years, I was asked to come to Toronto on the resignation of a very distinguished man whose work I was afraid to touch that of the late Professor Young. He had taught for ten years in Knox College, teaching both the Testament, the whole scope of New Testament work, and philosophy, and, I think, some other departments as well. He resigned in 1865 in order to take charge of the high schools. He was a high school inspector, and, as some of the gentlemen here present know, did very excellent work, which had been of permanent value to the Province, in that capacity.

I came here as quite a young person. I am not going to tell you my age exactly, but I was quite young at the time, and I did what I could, I know, in the most imperfect way. That was in 1866, and I have been working away for good or evil during these 36 years.

Knox College has existed since 1844. It has been now 58 years in operation. When I came to it the professors were Dr. Willis, Dr. Burns, and, I may say, Professor Young, for in three or four years he came back. These eminent persons have all passed away. Dr. Willis was a fine, ripe, theological scholar, a fine Greek scholar, well read in patristic literature, and in the post-Reformation literature. Dr. Burns was a man of marvelous energy, who never knew he was getting old; indeed he never did get old. Professor Young had qualities as a teacher which, I think my distinguished friend who has honored us with his presence to-night, Professor Watson, would endorse what I have said about Prof. Young. He was a man of marvelous intensity and enthusiasm in all his work. After teaching for a second term of three or four years, of course he went to the university, where he continued to teach philosophy until his lamented death. These are all gone, and three other professors with whom I have worked are gone. My young friend, first my student, afterwards my colleague.

Mr. Thompson, an admirable man, after a few years of the teaching with poor health, passed away. Dr. Ingles, after one year, left us, taking a pastorate in Brooklyn, and long ago passed into the better land, and last year—this is a recent sorrow—we lost our young friend, Professor Douglas. You understand, therefore, that while I look back with pleasure, with a measure of satisfaction, although of humility, to my connection with the college, it is tinged with sadness when I think of these admirable men, two of them fathers who received me as their son and treated me with great kindness, the others beloved colleagues also.

Knox College had graduated 146 candidates to the ministry before I had anything to do with it. Since that time, that is since 1866, it has graduated 583. The whole number of its graduates is 729. If there is anything that I am proud of, and you will pardon the use of the word, it is that I have great pleasure wherever I go all over the Province in meeting ministers—I call them young ministers, although some of them are not young now—who have been with me in the classes of Knox College.

Not only so, but the college has had the satisfaction of being on the best of terms with all the other theological schools in the church, and, further than that, our intercourse with the theological schools of other denominations in Toronto has been most kindly. It gives me great pleasure to see around me to-night eminent gentlemen representing these colleges, men whom I greatly esteem, my friend Principal Sheraton and the Chancellor of Victoria, and my friend Chancellor Wallace. It has been a great pleasure in connection with university work and other educational work from time to time to meet these honored brethren.

Noises In Your Chest.

The doctor hears some curious noises when he places the stethoscope against your chest. When the lungs are in a healthy condition, the medical gentleman hears a pleasant, breezy sound, soft in tone, as you draw in the breath and expel it. Should the instrument convey to his ear a gurgling or bubbling sound he makes a mental note of the fact that you are in what is known as the moist stage of bronchitis. In the dry stage of the same complaint the sound is a whistling, wheezy one.

One of the signs of pneumonia is the crackling note that comes through the stethoscope. It is not unlike the sound that can be heard when your finger and thumb have touched a sticky substance and you first place them together and then part them, holding them close to your ear.

Doctors occasionally hear a dripping sound, and that indicates that air and water have got into some part of the chest where they have no right to be. Blow across a bottle, and you will produce a sound which is actually to be heard in your chest. It is caused in the same way—that is, by air passing over a cavity.

The Lack of Reserve.

"He had no reserve." How often we hear this expression on 'change or in the street when a firm has failed or when a business man has been pushed to the wall! It would make a fitting epitaph for the grave of many a failure. A man without reserve is like a condemned, leaky vessel. On a calm day it can be towed from port to port, but it would be utterly helpless in a storm.

Many fail from lack of reserve of education, of early training, of solid, ingrained habit. Others fail from lack of reserve of savings, of capital. Many have gone down from the lack of character reserve, of health reserve, of friendship reserve. It pays to store up reserve of every kind, to be prepared for every emergency. Too exhausting effort, too extravagant expenditure, too reckless daring or too much reliance on unknown factors leaves no margin or reserve, so that a slip would mean a certain fall.

A Scotch Superstition.

"In a recent visit I paid to friends abroad I came across a superstition that was new to me," said a traveler the other day. "One day at dinner somebody hit a glass, which began the ringing, jingling noise that is familiar when glassware is struck, and immediately another guest covered the piece with his hands so as to muffle the sound. Every one present said, 'That's right; stop the ringing.' I found out on inquiring that when one causes this ringing of a glass piece to cease it saves a human life from drowning. How the notion originated I can't explain, but these people I speak of were intelligent and not generally given to cherishing absurd notions. It is said to be a Scotch superstition, but none of my friends could throw light on its origin."

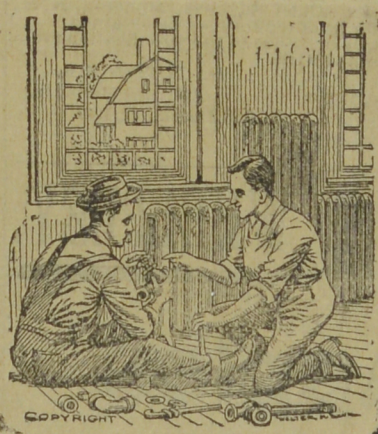
