DEATH OF EMMET BRODERICK.

Butte Boy Passes Away in a New York Hospital.

(Butte, Montana, Miner, Feb. 6.)

Mrs. Maggie Broderick, who conducts the Thornton rooming house, on East Broadway, received the sad news yesterday of the death of her son, Emmet Broderick in New York city. Last November Mrs. Broderick, after availing herself of all the medical skill that Butte afforded, upon the advice of a physician took her son to New York to undergo treatment for hip disease. The boy was placed in the Anthepedic hospital, where a specialty is made of the treatment of such diseases. After remaining in New York some time, Mrs Broderick started for home feeling much encouraged over the progress the boy was apparently making. She was advised almost daily as to her son's condition, and the latest reports were of an encouraging nature. However tuberculosis developed recently and yesterday the little fellow suffered a hemorrhage which resulted in his death. The boy, who was eleven years of age, had the best possible treatment that could be afforded, but at no time was there very much hope for his ultimate recovery.

Mrs. Broderick will have the sympathy of many friends in her deep affliction. While no arrangements have been made yet for the funeral, it is the intention to have the remains shipped to this city for burial.

THE SPORTSMEN'S SHOW.

The New Brunswick Exhibit Left for Boston This Afternoon.

The New Brunswick government exhibit for the Boston Sportsmen show left here at 4.30 o'clock this afternoon in a special car which will be attached to the Boston express. W. H. Carnall finished loading the car this forenoon, the last article to be put on board being a bundle of birch bark for the roof of the log cabin.

Chief Game Commissioner Knight, W. H. Carnall, Harry Allen and George E. Armstrong will leave for Boston on Monday to instal the exhibit in the Mechanics' Fair building where the show is to be held.

Following is an inventory of the goods, comprising the exhibit:

CHARGES AGAINST SUP'T.

Government Commissioner to Look Into P. L. Asylum Management.

The General Public hospital is not the only public institution whose affairs and administration are to be investigated by a government commission. The Provincial Lunatic Asylum is to undergo the same process.

Dr. Travers, assistant superintendent, has made to the local government complaints against Dr. George A. Hetherington, the superintendent of the institution. Other complaints have been made and for some time the government has heard unsatisfactory reports which have been noised about as to the conduct of affairs in the big building "across the bridge."

Attorney General Pugsley is constituting a commission to thoroughly investigate all matters pertaining to asylum management and discipline.

PLAYED A DRAW.
