BOSTON SENSATION.

Prominent Society Man Arrested for Murder.

VICTIM A GIRL FROM NOVA SCOTIA.

Employed in the Laundry of an Insane Asylum.

Boston, Nov. 4.—Allan O. Mason, a prominent club man of this city, has been arrested on suspicion of having been connected with the murder of Miss Clara Morton, a girl from Nova Scotia, on Saturday night.

Boston, Nov. 4.—State Officer Danham will to-day arrest a man whom he believes he will be able to prove is "Jack the Slugger," slayer of Clara Morton, murdered in the McLean Asylum grounds, Waverly, Saturday night. The man is a wealthy Boston manufacturer, a club man, and a member of the highest social standing in Boston for years.

The suspect has been an inmate of two insane asylums. His ailment has been classed as melancholia, but he has been violent at times and has been known to attack women. He is said to have posed as a woman hater.

The police declare they are able to prove that he was seen and recognized by five persons in and about the McLean grounds Saturday night. Furthermore he was seen where the murdered girl's chatelaine bag was found.

It is also declared that he has been identified as the assailant in another case.

No greater sensation could happen in social circles than the arrest of this man. He poses as a social leader and his arrest will stir society to its foundations.

Miss Morton, the laundress employed at the McLean Asylum, who was assaulted on the grounds of the institution Saturday evening by an unknown person, and who died Sunday, was unconscious from the time of the attack till she died.

Miss Morton came from Nova Scotia and had been employed at the hospital for three years. The police and the citizens hereabouts are much disturbed over the frequency of such assaults as that of Saturday night. Within the past month eight assaults upon women, besides that upon Miss Morton, have been committed in Cambridge, Somerville and nearby places, while during the summer there were six other cases in the same territory, two of which resulted fatally.

Miss Morton was the daughter of the late Holmes Morton, of Somerset, Kings county, Nova Scotia, and cousin of Charles Morton, North street, Halifax. She was in Halifax on October 21, on her way from Somerset, where she attended the marriage of her sister.

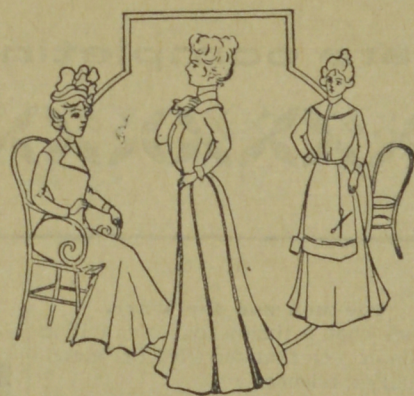
