Winnipeg, April 15.—A carload of pressed Manitoba wheat, with straw and heads, was shipped east by the C. P. R. today. The wheat will be used to decorate the Canadian grain arch to be erected in London for the coronation ceremonies.

KILLED BY GUN BURST.

Queenstown, April 15.—Gunner Lieut. James Bourne, Lieut. Miller and nine blue jackets were instantly killed by the bursting of a twelve inch gun on board the British first class battleship Mare, during practice off Beerhaven. Several men were injured.

DRIVEN TO SUICIDE.

Toronto, April 15.—A despatch from Chicago says that yesterday Mrs. F. H. Goldman, wife of a jewellery dealer in Toronto, committed suicide by turning on gas in her room and taking carbolic acid. She had become broken-hearted on account of a wayward son, and was driven to desperation because she was unable to get him out of prison in Chicago, where he is held for robbery. Toronto neighbors allege that domestic trouble at home may also have had something to do with the tragedy.

RHODES' GIFT RESENTED.

A German Paper Considers it an Insult.

Berlin, April 15.—Everybody is so accustomed to reviling Mr. Rhodes that the provision in his will providing scholarships for Germany at first simply caused amazement, and later was re-

sented as a covert insult. The Cologne Volks Zeitung, a leading Centrist organ, for instance, doubts if any German student can be found "who will accept the bounty of such a person as Mr. Rhodes," and says that many persons hold the acceptance of the scholarships to be morally impossible for any German. The paper fears, however, that some few Germans will be enticed by filthy lucre.

MAY PROCLAIM A HOLY WAR.

Sultan's Possible Reply to Bulgarian and Macedonian Revolt.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

New York, April 15.—The Sun this morning prints the following from Constantinople, under the date of April 14.

The serious situation arising from the Macedonian and Bulgarian upheaval has created the belief among Mahometans in many parts of the Ottoman empire that the Sultan will proclaim a holy war. Consequently a great number of them are offering their services as volunteers. It is asserted, but not confirmed, that the Turkish officials are equipping many of these as Bashi Bozouks, to pursue Macedonian bands, and serious excesses are feared.

Undoubtedly the strain between Bulgaria and Turkey, is tightening, a religious, or, rather, ecclesiastical, incident greatly irritating the ill-feeling. It is believed that the sultan has issued, or will issue, a firman authorizing the consecration of Mgr. Firmilian, a Servian prelate, who was in 1897 appointed archbishop of Uskub, but who hitherto has not been consecrated, owing to Bulgarian opposition.

Servia is accused of doing her utmost to procure his consecration, which will certainly inflame the situation, and, according to Bulgarians here, would be followed by a declaration of Bulgarian independence.

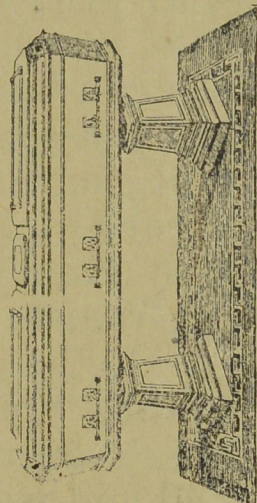
