### THE DOLL IS ILL.

An odd branch of doll service is tend-  
ing the pet in sickness. Dolls appear to  
be subject to all the complaints of their  
young nurses. They are picky, too,  
by the familiar nursery methods.

The realistic impulse to detect some-  
thing like the "poorly" look in the doll  
is illustrated by the diagnosis of leprosy  
in the case of a doll from whom "the  
paint was flaking off." If all the paint  
comes off and the doll takes on a pitiful  
pallor, there is a fine opportunity for  
the child's healing art. In one instance  
the appearance of measles was induced  
by the help of a red lead pencil. In an-  
other instance, when a doll was con-  
valescent after fever, the "pretense"  
was supported by deliberately pulling  
out the hair. Fractures of limb or skull  
and slighter injuries leading to loss of  
the vital sustaining sawdust have, of  
course, to be treated surgically.

Doll surgery, however, to judge by  
the number of maimed and deformed  
figures which are to be found in doll  
land, would seem to be by no means

### BRITISH BREAKFAST TABLE.

A Review of British Imports For This  
Service During 1901.

A review of what may be described  
as the breakfast table imports for  
1901, shows that while our colonies  
obtained a slightly smaller share of  
the trade than before, Russia secured  
a considerably increased propor-  
tion.

The bill for butter imported from  
overseas was £19,297,005, which is  
£1,837,000 more than in the pre-  
vious year, and fully £2,084,000  
more than in 1899. The lion's share  
went to Denmark, which secured £8,-  
950,497. Though much of the Rus-  
sian butter which formerly came  
through Denmark now reaches us di-  
rect, the advance of the Danish to-  
tal for the year is no less than  
£930,000.

Russia sent the next largest quan-  
tity of butter and for the first time  
passed the million mark, with a bill  
for £1,665,352. France, which ob-  
tains a higher price for its smaller  
product, exceeded this figure with a  
total charge of £1,704,128. So Rus-  
sia for the first time takes second  
place for quantity and third for val-  
ue.

Holland received just over a mil-  
lion and a half sterling for butter.  
Canada took fully a million, which  
was a marked improvement on 1900,  
but rather less than in 1899.

New Zealand, with £819,534, show-  
ed an increase of £25,000, while all  
the Australian colonies experienced a  
falling off. Victoria received only  
£921,505, as compared with £1,-  
296,438 in 1900, and over a million  
in the preceding year.

We imported last year 2,048,735,-  
400 eggs, for which we paid £5,495,-  
776, an increase of £89,000.

Russia maintains the pre-eminence  
in this market, sending the greatest  
quantity and obtaining the enormous  
sum of £1,207,483. This is only  
£24,000 more than in 1899, but it is  
£98,000 more than in 1900. Den-  
mark has wrested the second place  
from Germany, with £1,160,948, as  
compared with Germany's £895,624.

Belgium is credited with £805,241,  
and is fourth. France has fallen  
from £867,000 in the two previous  
years, with the third place in 1899  
and the fourth in 1900, to £696,125  
and fifth place. Canada also shows  
a diminishing trade, receiving only  
£255,766, or £33,000 less than in  
the previous year.

The total quantity of bacon im-  
ported shows little increase, but the  
bill went up nearly two millions to  
well over 13½ millions sterling. The  
United States received 9½ millions,  
Denmark fully 3½, both of them  
showing an enormous advance. Can-  
ada, on the other hand, fell from  
£1,075,445 to £921,509.

Out of the 4½ millions spent on  
foreign and colonial hams, the Un-  
ited States received £4,209,813, an  
increase of £453,000. Canada fell  
from £146,942 to £304,822. — Lon-  
don Daily Mail.

### Ermine for the Coronation.

It is calculated that about 103,-  
900 skins of the ermine will be used  
to make the peers and princesses'  
robes for the coronation and that as  
the price of this fur has much in-  
creased in view of the demand about  
£135 worth will be needed for the  
ceremonial.
