A LADY'S SUDDEN DEATH.

Moncton, Oct. 2.—A sudden death among the attendants at the exhibition at Port Elgin today cast a gloom over the place.

Mr. and Mrs. Silas Allan, of Cape Spear, drove to the exhibition this morning at nine o'clock and having almost reached their journey's end were driving along by the exhibition grounds. Suddenly Mr. Allan felt his wife lean towards him and her head fall on his shoulder, and before he realized the fact, discovered she was dead from heart failure.

The deceased was a daughter of Stephen Davis of Bayside, and was about 51 years old.

DEATH OF GEO. J. BURNS.

Former Well Known Frederictonian Passes Away in Minnesota.

Mr. George J. Burns, formerly of this city, died at Fairmont, Minnesota, Sept. 52, after a few days illness of pneumonia. He left Fredericton for the west 16 years ago. Mr Burns was the proprietor of the home bakery and restaurant, and a resident at Fairmont for two years and a half. The Daily Sentinel says: "He

was a most industrious and honorable man, just and fair in all his dealings." He leaves a wife and four young children, three daughters and one son, in Fairmont, and two grown sons by a former marriage in St Paul. His age was 52 years. Mr Burns belonged to the M. W. A., and M. B. A., and the Yeoman's lodge, joining the latter only a month ago, and carried insurance in each of them. His widow was formerly Miss Kate Connolly of Fredericton, and a niece of Very Rev. Monsignor Connolly. [The deceased gentleman is well remembered by many persons in this city. He was twice married, his wives being daughters of the late Cornelius Connolly. James Burns, an employee of the Mitchell boom, is a half brother of the deceased, and J. G. Connolly of the customs service, is a brother-in-law.]

Approaching Nuptials.

Invitations are out for the marriage of Dr. George J. McNally of this city, to Miss Nellie May, daughter of Rev. J. E. Flewelling of Canterbury, and until recently a valued member of the nursing staff of Victoria Hospital, this city. The ceremony will be performed at St. John's Baptist church Edmundston, from the home of Miss Flewelling's aunt, Mrs. Charles Main, at 10 o'clock on the morning of October 15th.

The Boer Farmers.

Ottawa, Oct. 2.—The Boer delegates will be taken from Montreal to visit the Napan experimental farm in the maritime provinces, then to Truro provincial farm, and afterwards to the fruit district at Wolfville. From there they will likely go to P. E. Island and then to Carleton county (N. B.). After visiting Ottawa and Western Ontario they will proceed to the Canadian Northwest, where a good portion of their time will be spent.

Cholera Scourge.

Berlin, Oct. 1.—The Cologne Gazette from Alexander says that cholera is spreading through the whole of Egypt. Already 1,200 towns and villages are affected. An average of 1,500 new cases are reported daily. During the last two months there have been more than 26,000 cases, more than 90 per cent of them proving fatal. Many Europeans have been stricken. The Gazette urges that a conference of the powers be held to suppress the Mohammedan pilgrimage to Mecca, which is most dangerous centre of infection.

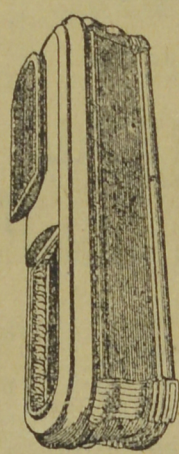

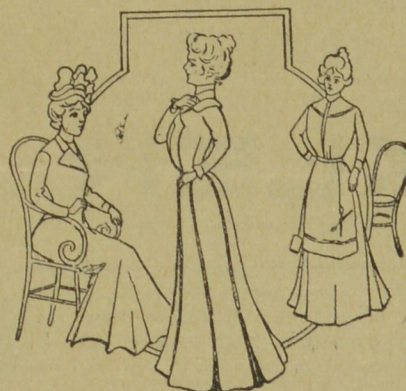
