OTTAWA BUDGET DEBATE.

Hon. W. S. Fielding, Canada's popular and efficient finance minister, was able to present to Parliament in his budget speech a glowing account of the prosperity of the country under Liberal rule. Business in every line is active and remunerative, the agricultural and mineral resources of the Dominion are rapidly developing, settlers of an excellent class are peopling the northwest, manufacturing enterprises are expanding, and amidst all the revenue of the country is buoyant. Mr. Fielding was also able to congratulate the country on the excellent friendly relations existing among all races, creeds and classes in Canada, and altogether the condition of the Dominion was one to delight its most sanguine friends.

Mr. Borden, who followed in the debate, could not deny the truthfulness of the picture that the finance minister painted, but the opposition leader thinks things would be better if we had a little more protection, and moved the following amendment to the motion to go into supply:

"This house, regarding the operation of the present tariff as unsatisfactory is of the opinion that this country requires a declared policy of such adequate protection of its labor, agricultural products, manufacturers and industries, as will at all times secure the Canadian market for Canadians, and while firmly maintaining the necessity of such protection to Canadian interest, this house affirms its belief in a policy of reciprocal trade preference within the empire."

Sir Richard Cartwright replied to Mr. Borden and seems to have been in good form. He defended the government's fiscal and immigration policies, pointed out how the growth of the country had been retarded by Conservative rule, especially in the Northwest, and closed with an effective reference to the carnival of corruption that existed during the last years of Conservative government. He touched on the expulsion of Sir Hector Langevin, the charges against Caron and the other scandals of 1891, as well as camp followers like John Charles Rykert, and said that the only one of them all for whom he was sorry was Thomas McGreevy. When he considered how McGreevy suffered, how he became broken hearted so that honorable gentleman opposite might have campaign funds to keep them in power he (Sir Richard) came to the conclusion that if there was any true repentance among them they would erect a monument to the memory of Thomas McGreevy, and he (Sir Richard) would give them an inscription which would read: "To the memory of Thomas McGreevy, victim and martyr, who did more than any other human being to put the Conservative party in power in 1878 and kept them in power regardless of expense for 13 years. Had he served his country as faithfully as he served his party leaders, the name of Thomas McGreevy would have stood extremely high in the roll of Canadian patriots."

THE CONTEST IN BEAUHARNOIS.

The only pending federal bye-election is that now in progress in Beauharnois, Quebec, where polling takes place next Wednesday. In the last general election Mr. Bergeron who beat Mr. Tarte in 1896, was himself defeated by Mr. Loy who was subsequently unseated. Mr. Bergeron and Mr. Loy are again facing each other, and the contest is a hot one. Mr. Tarte, Mr. Bernier, and Mr. Patterson, ministers of the crown, assisted Mr. Loy in his opening meeting of the campaign and Mr. Bergeron had the help of Mr. Monk M. P. Beauharnois is almost exclusively French and Roman Catholic, but the electors of that constituency are evidently broad minded men, for they elected Mr. Loy a Presbyterian elder in the last election, and Mr. Tarte declared that when they did this they gave a valuable lesson to other constituencies in Canada.

Mr. Loy's majority eighteen months ago was only forty-five. Mr. Bergeron is a strong man on the stump with a record of twenty years in parliament, so that the Liberals may have to hustle to hold the county.

DEAF AND DUMB INSTITUTION.

The Herald is in receipt of the nineteenth annual report of the Fredericton Institution for the Deaf and Dumb, so ably and successfully conducted by Mr. A. F. Woodbridge, and the record of the past year's work is very creditable to all concerned.

The total attendance of pupils for the year was forty-two, twenty-two boys and twenty girls, representing nearly every county in the province. The health of the pupils was excellent, and the general condition of the school quite satisfactory. Financially too the Institution has prospered although a better appreciation of its work in that way is still desirable. The receipts from all sources were \$5,834.81 and the expenditure only \$16.61 less. The government grant was \$500 and of the balance of the receipts \$356.50 was collected in Fredericton.

Mr. Woodbridge has proved himself a most efficient organizer and principal, and he is surrounded by a staff enthusiastic and successful in their duties. The Institution is now well established and is doing a splendid work for the deaf mutes of the province.

A war correspondent bears testimony to the personal bravery Lord Methuen exhibited in the battle in which he was made prisoner by the Boers. The general was in the thick of the fight, encouraged his men by voice and gesture, and became a conspicuous target for the Boer marksmen, who concentrated their fire on him as he rode from point to point.

The Telegraph, which was threatened with a libel suit by Mayor Daniel, as a result of some observations relating to His Worship's connection with the Board of Health and a St. John inquest, has withdrawn its charges and apologized for having published them.

The opposition in the Imperial House of Commons, Tuesday, attacked the government on their war management, and in the want of confidence vote that followed the ministry was sustained by a majority of 155.

Supt. Osborne of the C. P. R., and his staff are to be congratulated on the prompt manner in which they overcame the difficulties of the washouts. Today the trains are again running on schedule time.

The King's act of placing \$150,000 at the disposal of the London corporation for feasting the poor of that city during coronation week, is worthy of the big heart of His Majesty.

In the final party division in the Ontario legislature before the prorogation of that body the Ross Liberal government had the very comfortable majority of nineteen.

The British Columbia government propose a redistribution bill by which the number of members of the legislature will be increased from 38 to 42.
