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CORONATION CONTINGENTS.

Plans for Housing and Amusing the Troops.

WILL PROBABLY BE QUARTERED AT THE ALEXANDRA PALACE.

Officers to Take Their Horses—A Special Fund to Provide Amusements.

London, April 7.—Reports have for some days been current, says The Daily Mail, that the famous Alexandra Palace, perched on Muswell Hill and commanding what is probably the finest view of London that can be obtained, will become the camp selected for the Colonial troops, 2,500 in number, who are to visit London next May and stay for four weeks. The arrangements are not quite complete, but it seems that the matter can be taken as practically settled. Negotiations have been going on between the War Office and the Colonial Office authorities, acting jointly, and the trustees with a view to the utilization of the place for the purpose indicated.

The Colonial troops—Australians, Canadian, South African, Dyaks, Malays, Maltese, Cypriots and others—shall, it has been practically decided, be housed or encamped in the palace or its extensive grounds, and while these soldiers of the King will in no way interfere with the ordinary programme of entertainment provided for the visitors, they will, as it were, be on view in all their native splendor to all who care to make the journey to the palace from the last week in May until the beginning of July.

No better place could be found, either in the matter of position or accommodation. Some sixteen hundred of the troops—all the whites, in fact—will be housed under cover. Some will live and sleep in the upper part of the main building, the splendid balcony that runs along nearly the whole of the front being turned into a dormitory, and the remainder in the banquet hall in the grounds. The officers will also have accommodation provided for them and their servants in the main building, in which there is a sufficiency of delightful rooms—airy, light, and commanding magnificent views over the surrounding country.

The black troops will be encamped in what is called the "Grove," a seven-acre plot of land overshadowed by trees adjoining the main building. From here, too, a splendid view is obtainable, and on all but the sultriest days a cooling breeze may be relied upon. No healthier place could be imagined.

It is expected that the officers commanding these contingents will bring their own horses, while for the cavalrymen mounts will be sent from Aldershot. For all these horses ample stable accommodation will be found.

The men will be allowed, subject to the ordinary barrack discipline, to amuse themselves in the palace in every way, and there will be no lack of entertainment. A sum of money, it is expected, will be placed at the disposal of the palace authorities for providing bands, variety entertainments, and so forth. The race-course will not be interfered with, except possibly on one day, when it is probable that the King will review the troops. The public will have free access to the camp of the black troops in the Grove, along which on both sides runs a road giving entrance to the main part of the palace grounds.

In point of situation the palace is exceptional. When the troops have to come to town for coronation ceremonies the infantry can entrain from the palace itself, and reach King's-cross in about half an hour, while the cavalry can get to the same point almost as soon by riding down through Crouch Hill and Kentish Town. Another point in favor of the scheme is the commodious kitchen accommodation, which, with a supply of cooks, will be quite equal to the task of feeding the 2,500 officers and men of the Colonial contingent.

A PRO-BOER DEMONSTRATION.

European and American Pro-Boers to Celebrate Jun 227th.

London, April 8.—The Brussels correspondent of The Standard reports that Dr. Leyds is about to organize a great international demonstration of continental and American pro-Boer sympathizers for the 27th of June, the day of King Edward's coronation procession. All the pro-Boer societies of Belgium, Holland, France, Germany, Russia and the United States are invited by a special circular note, inspired by the Transvaal legation at Brussels, to adorn their homes with Transvaal and Orange State flags, and to send telegrams to Mr. Kruger. The scheme is intended as a demonstration against British feelings on the King's coronation.
