The Vancouver World censures Mr. Borden, the Tory leader, for travelling to that city and holding a reception on Sunday.

Supporters of the local government, according to Mr. Fred Sproul, are brigands and buccaneers, elegant language for a man aspiring to a seat in the legislature. The opinion King's county electors hold of Mr. Sproul is indicated by the fact that on three occasions they have rejected his ambition to represent them in the assembly.

The Chatham World, at loss for political ammunition for use against Premier Tweedie, attacked his son, charging the young man with using the yacht club funds for his own purpose. An investigation was demanded and the World withdrew the charges under compulsion, Mr. Tweedie's son coming out of the trial with flying colors.

It transpires that Mr. Anderson, nominated as opposition candidate in St. John county, and heralded as a convert from the government party, did all in his power to elect Mr. Sproul, opposition candidate in King's county, a few months ago. Mr. Anderson is a brother-in-law of Mr. Sproul, and the association has led the St. John men astray.

The St. John local opposition are already having their troubles. The labor candidates, Hatheway and Macinerney, are distasteful to the Painters' Union, who represent a large section of the labor men and they have withdrawn from the Union. It is said that other trades will follow the painters' example. The laboring men are beginning to see that Hatheway and Macinerney were foisted on them by the Tory machine.

The Telegraph's call to Liberals not to attend the opposition convention in St. John this evening has sent the Sun into a panic. The Tory organ knows that its candidates will have no chance of success in that city without Liberal votes, and it is using every effort to ring in the Liberals, but not very many will be influenced by the cunning device. The Sun terms the Telegraph's call "insolent." What then was the Moncton Tory convention's action in 1898, when all Conservatives were ordered out of the local government ranks.

Mr. Hazen has only delivered one speech yet in his political campaign, but in that he has given indication that the opposition propose to stop at nothing in the way of misrepresentation. Mr. Hazen at St. Martins in discussing the bridge enquiry, censured Dr. Pagsley for voting in the house to sustain the government while he was a member of the administration. Mr. Hazen must have known that Dr. Pagsley was then a private member of the house and not a member of the government, yet he sets a misrepresentation afloat to injure a political opponent.

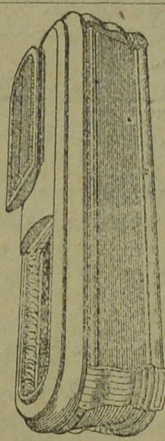

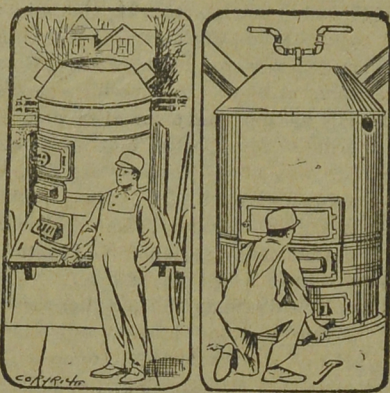

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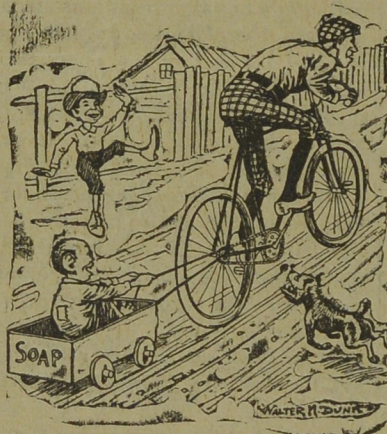
