

CANADIANS ABROAD.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier and
His Colleagues

ENTERTAINED A DISTINGUISHED
COMPANY TO A BANQUET.

Newfoundland and Confedera-
tion Discussed at Canada
Club Dinner.

Toronto, July 16.—The Telegram's special cable from London says: "Sir Wilfrid Laurier and members of his cabinet, Sir William Mulock, Sir Frederick Borden, Hon. W. S. Fielding and Hon. William Paterson, who are with him in London, returned the hospitalities extended to them while in England, by entertaining a distinguished company at dinner at the Hotel Cecil last night. Her Royal Highness Princess Louise, Lord and Lady Minto, Lord and Lady Strathcona and Lady Aberdeen were among the notable persons present.

"It is understood there will be four more meetings before the finish of the colonial conference.

"As the coronation procession has been cancelled the soldiers will not be required from Canada. There are 13 men also some men of the Canadian Hussars, Strathconas, Canadian Mounted Rifles and the governor general's body guard, who will represent Canada as a mounted escort. Major Forrester will command.

"A private meeting of shipping men in regard to a fast Atlantic line, has resulted, it is understood, in the Elder Dempster and Allans uniting forces to secure a subsidy from Canada and Great Britain. It is expected Great Britain will give half of the whole amount."

London, July 17.—The Canada Club dinner last night was attended by the colonial premiers now in London and many other distinguished guests. Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal presided.

Premier Barton, of Australia, in the course of an address, made the first public reference to the plan for the confederation of Newfoundland and Canada. He said he hoped that all obstacles in the way of Newfoundland joining the Dominion would be removed.

Sir Robert Bond, prime minister of Newfoundland, replying, dwelt upon the great strategic value of Newfoundland, which, he said, stood as a sentinel at the gateway to the internal waters of Canada. He traced the phenomenal recuperative powers of the island, and referred to its present prosperity, declaring the question of confederation to be one of terms.

"If," said Sir Robert, "the terms are advantageous to the people of Newfoundland, I shall feel it my duty to lay the proposal before my people and, if necessary, exert myself to bring the confederation about. We are not jealous of Canada."

The Associated Press, however, is in a position to state that there is little likelihood of Canada's offering terms which Prime Minister Bond could present to the Newfoundland legislature.

Curious features of the affair are that neither Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the Canadian prime minister, the Canadian government, nor the imperial government has yet mentioned the matter to Sir Robert Bond or to his ministers, and that the ball should have been started rolling by Premier Barton.

Killed by the Train.

St. Andrews, N. B. July 17.—Robert Stevenson, building contractor, of St. Stephen was instantly killed by the C. P. R. train three miles from St. Andrews yesterday. He was driving to Sir William Van Horne's, where he was doing some work, when the train struck his carriage. The horse was cut in pieces. Two cars—one a freight and the other a horse car, containing Hosmer's horses from Montreal—were derailed. There were about 20 passengers on the train. None of them were injured.

Stevenson was about 63 years old and a widower. He has one daughter and two sons—Alexander and Harry, the latter building contractor at Sydney.

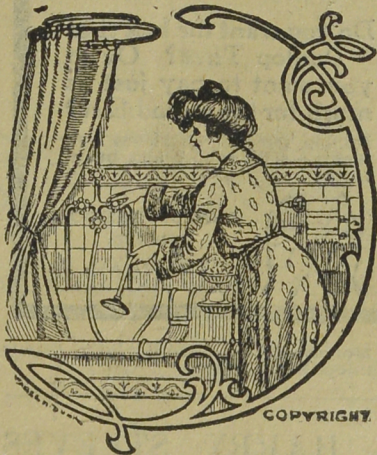
PRESENTED WITH A PURSE.
