A CANDIDATE ON WHEELS.

There is a hot contest on for the mayoralty of Truro, N. S. The candidates are Mayor Stuart, seeking reelection, and J. Harvey Kent, a prominent business man, who, however, is somewhat handicapped in his canvas by the fact that he is a cripple unable to walk. Mr. Kent, is an active man carrying on a large and successful mercantile business, and gets around by means of a two wheeled rubber tired vehicle pushed by his man. In his little carriage Mr. Kent goes everywhere, to church, to social meetings, and when Mayor Stuart was making a speech to the electors the other night, Mr. Kent was wheeled in and had his say to the people. Among other things Mr. Kent observed, "Another canvas that I found against me is that I go on wheels. I am using the best locomotive God has given me. I have heard of some people making this accusation against me who require wheels in their heads to keep them steady. I am not an invalid. I call a man an invalid who will go around with all his limbs, and then cannot earn a living for himself."

Mr. Kent has had a successful business career, in spite of his physical disability, is well fixed financially, and is proving a vigorous candidate against Mayor Stuart, who by many has hitherto been considered quite invincible. The Herald has no particular interest in the election, but its sympathy naturally is with the gentleman who has the pluck and energy, under Mr. Kent's handicap, to make a fight for the highest office in the gift of his fellow citizens.

HISTORY REPEATS ITSELF.

The Toronto Globe is cruel enough to recall an incident in the history of the Tory party which its members would like to see buried in oblivion. It seems that the cry of French domination is not a new one with the party. "Fifty years ago," says the Globe, "the Canadian Tories howled about French domination, fired the Parliament buildings, stoned a Governor-General, and threatened annexation, all because of "French domination." Finding that this course of proceeding kept them out of power, they calmly entered into an alliance with these terrible French-Canadians, whom they had been calling rebels, etc., and maintained themselves in office in that way for many years. This reversal of the old Tory policy was the secret of Sir John Macdonald's success. When they lost the French-Canadians, which was the front of St John's policy, they began to howl French domination and disloyalty again, just as they did in the days of Lafontaine and Baldwin. When they find that they cannot win office in this way they will bid for French-Canadian support again."

When parliament opens at Ottawa, the boys of Black Rod will be made by an old newspaper man, Mr Molyneux St John, for many years prominent in newspaper circles having been appointed to the position. Mr St John will no doubt execute the necessary physical gyrations with all the grace natural to the profession of which he has so long been a distinguished member.

Two Incidents in a Career.

Two incidents stand out in relief in the career of Col. Joseph Frederic des Barres. He was the instructor in navigation of Captain Cook, and it was into his arms that Wolfe sank dying from the fatal bullet at Quebec. Des Barres was acting as Wolfe's Aide-de-Camp during the battle, and was in the act of making a report when the General fell. Previously he had served in the Indian frontier wars and at the taking of Louisbourg, and he was later the directing engineer at the restoration of the fortifications of Quebec to a condition of capable defence. Subsequently he was engaged in surveying the harbors and inlets of the shores of Nova Scotia, Newfoundland, and, in fact, the whole of the North Atlantic coast, where navigation was till then extremely dangerous, and it is upon his labors as a hydrographer that he is now remembered. In 1784 he was appointed Governor of Cape Breton and subsequently of Prince Edward Island. He attained to the extraordinary age of 102, dying on October 24, 1824.

Food, Brains and Genius.

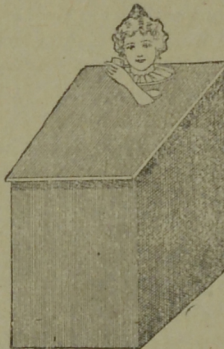
