

COUNCIL IN SESSION.

(CONTINUED ON THIRD PAGE.)

Coun McFarlane explained that it was Coun Moffatt who seconded the resolution, and not Coun Cropley. The latter had seconded a resolution to superannuate Mr. Haining, but had wanted to make the allowance \$50 instead of \$100.

Coun Cliff did not think the committee had a right to deal with such questions.

Coun. McFarlane explained that the committee had done nothing more than make a recommendation in regard to Mr. Haining.

Coun. Rowley said he would move that the report be adopted with the exception of the paragraph dealing with Mr. Haining.

Coun. McFarlane said that Mr. Haining had served the county faithfully for forty-years, and he did not think that the committee had exceeded its duty in dealing with his case. The judges had recommended Mr. Haining's superannuation, as he was getting too old to discharge his duties and he (McFarlane) thought it would be a disgrace to the county to turn him out without some allowance.

Coun Rowley's second resolution was then put to the meeting and carried, and the Haining recommendation was expunged from the report.

Coun McManiman moved that Mr. Haining be given a superannuation allowance of \$100 per year by the council.

The resolution was recorded by Coun McFarlane.

Coun Cropley, moved in amendment seconded by Coun Grosvenor, that Mr. Haining be given an allowance of \$50 per year.

Coun McFarlane said that \$50 a year was not sufficient for Mr. Haining, to live upon. He should have at least \$100.

Coun McMullin thought that \$50 was sufficient. He believed the people of Fredericton would take care of Mr. Haining and would not let him want for anything. That was what was done in the country districts.

The amendment was then put and carried on the following division:

Yeas.—Simmons, Cliff, Cropley, Veysey, Fawcett, McMillan, Timmins, Fraser, McKeen, Estey, Jamieson, Grosvenor, Burden, Reynolds—14.

Nays.—Thompson, Brook, Scott, Murray, McFarlane, Greer, Rowley, Young, Morgan, Haining, Moffatt, Merrill, McManiman—13.

On motion of Coun. McManiman the following amounts were ordered to be assessed on the parish of Stanley: Land damages for laying out new road, \$16; support of poor, \$400; contingencies, \$15; parish indebtedness, \$150; district clerks, \$6, and that assessors be paid 3 per cent, and collectors 5 per cent.

The following amounts were ordered to be assessed on New Maryland: support of poor, \$122; parish clerk, \$4, and that assessors and collectors be paid at the rate of 3 per cent.

The following amounts were ordered to be assessed on the parish of North Lake: Support of poor, \$200; for parish election, 1899 and 1901, \$4; parish clerk, \$5; use of room for parish elections, \$4; and that the assessors and collectors be paid 5 per cent. for assessing, and \$3 each for assessing road tax, and 5 per cent for collecting.

The following amounts were ordered to be assessed on the parish of Canterbury: Support of poor, \$325; parish indebtedness, \$100; parish clerk, \$5; use of room for parish elections, \$2; and that assessors and collectors be paid the same as last year.

The following amounts were ordered to be assessed on the parish of Dumfries: Support of poor, \$50; parish clerk, \$2; and that the assessors and collectors receive 5 per cent.

The following amounts were ordered to be assessed on the Parish of Queensbury: support of poor, \$100; commissioner of highways, \$25; support of patient in asylum, \$65; parish clerk \$5; district clerk \$5; pound district No 3 to build a pound, \$25; and that the assessors and collectors be paid the same as last year.

The following amounts were ordered to be assessed on the parish of Southampton: Support of poor, \$350; parish indebtedness, \$100; commissioners of highways, \$40; use of room for parish elections, \$2; and that the assessors and collectors be paid the same as last year.

The following amounts were ordered to be assessed on the parish of St. Mary's: Support of poor, \$500; support of lunatic, \$65; parish clerk, \$4; and that the assessors be paid 3 per cent. for assessing and collectors 5 per cent.

The following amounts were ordered to be assessed on the parish of Douglas: Support of the poor, \$450; support of lunatic, \$65; parish clerk, \$4; district clerk \$2; and that the assessors and collectors be paid the same as last year.

The list of parish officers for the parishes of New Maryland, Queensbury, Southampton and St. Marys were confirmed on motion of the councillors for those parishes.

Coun Brooks wanted to know why it was that in his parish young men, qualified to vote in Dominion or provincial elections, were denied the right to vote in municipal elections. He thought the law should be amended.

The matter was discussed by Couns Fawcett, Scott, Thompson, Rowley, McManiman and McMullen, and it was finally decided to recommend that some changes be made in the law relating to the qualification of voters in municipal elections. A committee was appointed to prepare a resolution on the subject.

At twelve o'clock the council adjourned.
