London's Severest Winter.

The great snowstorm, when the
Thames was frozen over for nearly
four months, occurred in 1683-84.
The frost continued without inter-
mission from December to February,
snow coming down almost continu-
ously, so that some parts of the
country were well nigh impassable.
To add to the discomfort a bitter
east wind blew all the time. Ships
anxious to enter the port of London
were obliged to remain at the mouth
of the Thames, and the crews suffer-
ed great privations. Provisions were
dear, horses and cattle often died
of cold and scarcely a bird lived
through the winter.

The citizens of London, however,
resolving on having some profit out
of the extraordinary weather, built
a regular colony on the icebound
Thames. Shops, taverns, coffee
houses, booths for dramatic repre-
sentations, printing offices and simi-
lar buildings sprang up like magic.
The winter was probably the sever-
est ever known in England, though
the following one of 1684-85 was
famous for its extreme cold.—Lon-
don Tit-Bits.

Scottish Gardeners.

Lord Rosebery's remark in Edin-
burgh that Scotland has produced
the greatest gardeners in the world
recalls a rather cynical saying of Dr.
Johnston on the subject of Scottish
gardening. At Mrs Terale's one
evening Boswell remarked that Eng-

afterwards his hearing returned, and
then his speech. He can now hear
perfectly, and speak fluently in Ital-
ian, French and Portuguese, and
somewhat imperfectly in English.
