Reginald Vanderbilt Taken to Task.

HIS ADVENTURES SUBJECT OF FAMILY COUNCIL.

Said to Have Lost Quarter of a Million Gambling.

New York, April 30.—The Vanderbilts at a family reunion have decided that the gambling of young Reginald must stop.

"Reggie" was present, and was taken to task for his exploits, which have not only shocked his relatives, but the young man's friends.

While Reginald is a millionaire many times over, according to the terms of his father's will, the rest of the family do not consider that this gives him any right to spend something like a quarter of a million dollars in the gambling house of one Canfield, nor do they relish the publicity attending the affair.

Then, too, Reginald's exploits with his speeding automobile about New Haven streets, where he is finishing his last year at Yale, have come in for much adverse criticism in the New Haven papers, and this, too, has been a source of worry to the young man's family.

A result of the "family council" was the extraction of a promise from the young man to give Canfield's wide berth in the future. Upon other matters, however, Mr. Vanderbilt was not in such accord with his solicitous relatives.

The young millionaire is reported to have said that while he was willing to cease gambling, he did not think that it was necessary to deny himself the pleasures which his fortune enabled him to indulge in, and the comforts with which he had surrounded himself in his student quarters.

No attempt was made to insist upon his giving up his luxurious apartments, but the advisability of tempering down his display in the matter of speeding his automobile was urged upon the young man, and he eventually agreed to make himself less conspicuous in that detail.

It is probable, therefore, that the automobile will be allowed to rest quietly in its shed in New Haven, or, if it is taken out, it will be run at a demure pace through the university town and along the country roads, so that the townsfolk will have no cause for adverse comment.

Reginald is a manly young fellow, with a fine flow of spirits, and a disposition to enjoy to the fullest extent the fortune of which he has just come into possession. He likewise has a supreme contempt for public opinion, and a defiant strain in his disposition which, but for the intervention of his family, might have led him to continue his visits to Canfield's.

Mr. Vanderbilt has only recently recovered from a slight attack of pneumonia, and it is understood that in a short time he will take a sea trip, on which he will be accompanied by his private tutor, in order that he may not fall behind in his studies. He will be graduated from Yale in June.

MONTHLY STATISTICS.

Savings Bank Deposits and Imports Show a Large Increase.

The amount deposited in the government savings bank during the month of April was \$23,641, and the withdrawals totaled \$15,268.07. The amount due deposited on April 30 was \$853,143.74.

During the month of April the value of goods imported for consumption was no less than \$60,788, which is the best showing made in a single month for years. The duty received amounted to \$5,368.19. The imports for April, 1901 amounted to \$28,349, and the duty \$4,942.98.

The amount collected from the

OULTON WAS THREATENED

Received Letter Telling Him of Threats to Murder Him.

WRITER WARNED OULTON AGAINST TOM LONDON.

Oulton Badly Frightened—Mrs. Wells Read Letter.

Though nothing has yet been discovered to throw a definite light upon the Oulton mystery, the Sun says it is in possession of information that promises startling revelations.

Following a rumor that letters of a significantly threatening nature had been discovered around the Oulton house, a Sun reporter called upon Mrs. Emma A. Wells, who lived in the miser's house from November, 1900, to April 15, 1901, and asked her if any such had been received by Mr. Oulton during her stay.

"Yes, there was," she said. "I remember one perfectly. It came some time in March the last year I was there (1901). I don't exactly remember the date, though I know it was on the letter. I remember the day it came, for I got it at the door from Charles Elston, the postman, who died not long ago. I think the stamp on the envelope was marked Wickham. Mr. Oulton asked me to open it and read it to him. The letter inside was dated at Oak Point somewhere along the last of March. It was addressed 'Dear Friend, Mr. Isaac Oulton,' and was written by a woman who said she was a friend of Mr. Oulton's and wanted to warn him that Tom London was coming to St. John to murder him. She told him to look out for himself."

"What did Mr. Oulton think of that?" asked the reporter.

"He was scared to death. All the rest of the time I was there he was frightened to be left alone, and used to get very nervous whenever I went out. He fully believed that London was looking for his life, for he said that he had heard of other threats from the same man. He told me that London had stolen some money and a horse from him some time before, for which Oulton had a warrant issued. He seemed to think that London was seeking for revenge on this account."

Questioned closely, Mrs. Wells declared that this was the only letter of the kind she had ever known Oulton to receive, and reiterated the statements regarding the fright it aroused in him. She said she had told him to put the letter away carefully, for if anything happened to him she did not want to be accused of having any hand in it.

"He put the letter in a big box in which he kept receipts and bills and things. It was wrapped up with some others. I told Detective Killen about it, and he said he would look for it. I don't know whether he has found it or not."

Thomas London, whose name was mentioned in the warning letter, has been living up river of late, but is now in St. John.

Andrew Carnegie Gives Hopes of Fine Positions.

SAYS HE MAY BUY NUMBERS OF PROPERTIES IN DIFFERENT CITIES.

And Then 'I'll Give All You Boys Good Permanent Jobs.'

New York, April 30.—Before sailing for England on the St. Louis today, Andrew Carnegie said that in the no distant future he might buy a number of newspapers in different cities and—

the newspaper men of his acquaintance most of the important positions in their management. "Some of these days I may purchase a number of newspaper properties," said Mr. Carnegie to a knot of assembled reporters, "and give all you boys good, permanent jobs. I have had something like this in my mind for a long time, and quite soon I may think well to materialize the idea."

Mr. Carnegie has long taken great interest in newspaper work, and he manifested his desire to attain a more personal footing with the reporters by insisting today that he be photographed with the men sent from the local press to report his departure.

He arranged the reporters to his liking on the promenade deck of the St. Louis, and then, taking a position in the center of the group, directed the photographer to snap his camera.

"You know, boys," said Mr. Carnegie, by way of parting, "I have always considered myself, more or less, one of you. Anything I can do to better the newspaper men will give me infinite satisfaction."

"It is one of my greatest pleasures to meet the workers on papers, and I think no one is better acquainted than I am with the great work they do and the small hope there is of their taking their deserved position in the public eye. They sink their own great personalities in the papers they serve, and I think this ought not to be the case, at least, so universally."
