

## DAY IN PARLIAMENT.

Premier and Opposition  
Leader FavorableTO ASSISTING BERNIER TO DIS-  
COVER THE NORTH POLE.Bourassa's Motion Protesting  
Against Cattle Embargo  
Passed.

Ottawa, May 2.—Two petitions from the Canadian Press Association were presented to the government yesterday. One was to Sir Wilfrid Laurier asking that the association be reimbursed the \$1,800 expenses to which it was put in connection with the investigation into the paper combine. The other was to Mr. Fielding asking that the recent order in council reducing the duty on paper from 25 to 15 per cent. be made applicable to all news print. These were signed by Canadian publishers.

On motion to go into supply Mr. Charlton urged that the government grant an appropriation to Capt. Bernier for his proposed expedition to the North Pole.

Mr. Charlton proceeded to recount the record of polar expeditions, concluding with those of Peary and Baldwin, who, he feared, might succeed in reaching the pole before Capt. Bernier got there if Canada did not hurry up. Canadians were peculiarly fitted for this task by reason of their experience in exploration and familiarity with and fondness for adventure, and Capt. Bernier was admirably fitted for the task of commanding a polar expedition. He was of the race of La Salle and had the courage and perseverance to get to the North Pole if the government would give him the necessary assistance. (Cheers.)

As for the expense, Captain Bernier had secured subscriptions of \$20,000 but would require \$100,000.

Messrs. Clarke (Toronto), Flint (Yarmouth), Edwards (Russell), Ross (Victoria), Henderson, Marcell, Osler, Lennox and Wade supported the proposition. Messrs Richardson, (South Grey), Holmes, McCreary and Ross (Ontario) opposed it.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier sympathized with those who expressed hope that Canada should be the discoverer of the North Pole and also with the efforts of Capt. Bernier, which were deserving of recognition. If the enterprise was attended with success by a son of Canada all would regard it with great pride. He did not share the views of those who thought that the sentiment was not deserving of consideration. In sentiment there was not only the making of a nation but moral elevation and enthusiasm which no nation can exist without. He was not sure that the discovery of the pole might not be productive of wealth. The discovery of the Yukon was attended with wealth and the country was long held up to scorn. Material prosperity might follow the discovery of the North Pole and every heart in Canada would beat with pride if Capt. Bernier discovered it.

The premier spoke highly of Capt. Bernier, but he was surprised that only \$20,000 had been subscribed to aid the proposed expedition. It was evident that if Canada was going to contribute it was now clear she would have to give \$100,000.

It was also apparent that the majority of the house would support such proposition. The government would require to give some consideration to views expressed.

R. L. Borden said he would give favorable consideration to a proposition by the government such as was mentioned.

Mr. Bourassa moved expressing regret at the embargo on Canada cattle by Great Britain and asking that the premier look into the matter when attending the colonial conference.

Hon. Mr. Fielding said it was not customary for the government to accept such a motion on going into supply but it was one of those which he thought they could well accept. It was a firm but cautious protest against the embargo on Canadian cattle and would strengthen the hands of the premier when in London.

What Canada had to object were the grounds upon which embargo was placed, namely distaste in Canadian cattle when none existed. If the embargo was placed for protecting the British farmer against competition, Canada could not complain.

Mr. Borden did not altogether approve of the language of the resolution but he ended the spirit of it.

After some discussion it was unanimously passed.

## Death in the Tornado.

St. John, India, May 2.—The tornado first struck Poigola, the afternoon of April 23. From Poigola it moved to Sanachar,

where the India General Company's warehouses were destroyed by a great wave which was whirled out of the river by the wind. Everywhere in the path of the cyclone huts, trees, the roofs of houses and people were carried up into the air like paper. Thirty-one persons were killed at Sanachar, 110 were killed near Dacca, 175 were killed at Nagalband, while 100 were killed at Barnighat.
