A WEARY PILGRIMAGE.

Messrs. Hazen and Mott the opposition missionaries addressed a meeting at Milltown last night, but do not seem to have called out either a large or enthusiastic crowd of people. Former conspicuous supporters of the opposition were absent, and those who were on hand heard the same old story from Mr. Hazen—nothing new—simply a rehash of the leader's speeches in the legislature during the past four years. As for Mr. Mott it takes him his full time to explain why he ratted from the government, and then he makes a very poor job of it. The member for Restigouche makes no mention of the fact that he soured on the government because they dismissed a scaler who was too kind in an official way to one of Mr. Mott's supporters, and thus saved the province \$5,000 in stumpage dues that had been overlooked by the scaler.

The reason Mr. Hazen and his friend did not speak in St. Stephen was that there is no large public hall in that town, but the St. Andrew's Beacon in repelling the Courier's charge that the government has been neglectful of Charlotte's interests, suggested that Mr. Hazen might have delivered an oration from the public wharf built by the government, from the splendid steel bridge across the St. Croix erected largely from New Brunswick funds, or from the deck of one of the St. Croix steamers handsomely subsidized by the government.

Mr. Hazen will not make much headway with his campaign in Charlotte, when such a prominent opposition sympathizer as Mr. Almon Teed openly expresses the lack of confidence his party have in Mr. Hazen's leadership.

We observe that Mr. Hazen in regretting Mr. MacInerney's absence at the Milltown meeting declared that the latter would be a member of the next legislature and the next government. Is that so? Mr. Hazen will remember that at the Moncton convention, the then opposition leader announced that Mr. Hazen was to be a member of the government as soon as the elections then pending were over, but the prediction has not realized, and history will repeat itself.

THE PREMIER'S HOLIDAY.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier having straightened out the difficulties which arose from Mr. Tarte's antics while his leader was in Europe, will start on Monday for a few weeks rest in Virginia. The Premier's trip to Europe was no vacation for him. He was so lionized and feted that he had had scarcely a spare moment, and no wonder his digestion was disturbed. Sir Wilfrid has also been a busy man since he returned home, and he needs distraction from public duties to prepare for the arduous labors of the Parliamentary session. All his Canadian friends, and they number the great bulk of the people, will hope that the rest and change may do him infinite good, and that he may return home in vigorous health to pursue his patriotic service to his country.

AN ORATOR SUPPRESSED.

Some of the newspapers are still having fun at the Sun editor's expense because he was not given an opportunity to deliver his prepared speech at Mr. Hazen's Chatham meeting. It appears that Mr. Scott went north loaded up

to the chin with an indictment against the local government, but the opposition leader at the last moment declined to take the responsibility of unloading the Sun editor's oration on the unsuspecting Chatham people and he was shunted to one side. Only a few days previous to that the Sun had cast a reflection on the style of Mr. Hazen's eloquence and the editor was going to show at Chatham what a modern Demosthenes could be like. However the Hazen knife was into the editor and the floodgates of Canterbury street eloquence were kept closed. It was cruel to the editor but a mercy to the audience.

The Band of Nercy movement in the public schools is one that deserves every encouragement, and the Dean and Mr. Sampson are entitled to great credit for their efforts in that direction. The S. P. O. A., should take on new life after enlisting the active co-operation of the children. There is plenty of work for it to do in Fredericton. The number of lame horses for instance seen on the streets every day is a standing shame.

The season's winter port trade at St. John will practically open tomorrow on the arrival of the Allan Liner Parisian. Ten lines of steamers will make their terminus at St. John this winter and the trade is expected to far exceed all former years. The Liberal government has done well by our sister city and through it the whole province.

Mr. Tarte's paper has spread a report that Mr. Blair will shortly retire from public life on account of ill health. There is absolutely nothing in the rumor. The Minister of Railways is at present enjoying excellent health; he never felt fitter for his duties, and his friends can dismiss the Tarte report as a mischievous and groundless one.

Lord and Lady Minto and their staff have taken possession of Lord Strathcona's residence at Montreal for a month, and the fashionable people of that city are looking forward to gay times. Of course that moulder of Canadian etiquette, Major Maude, is of the governor general's entourage.

New Cardinal for Canada.

Montreal, Nov. 15.—A special from Rome says it is semi-officially stated that Monsignor Bruchesi, Archbishop of Montreal, is to be created a cardinal. He will fill the place in the College of Cardinals vacated by the death of Cardinal Taschereau.

Canada's new cardinal, Louis Paul Napoleon Bouchesi, is of Italian extraction, son of the late Paul Dominique Bruchesi, whose wife was a French-Canadian, Marie Caroline Aubry.

He is one of the youngest, if not the youngest, archbishop in the world, being in his 47th year. He was born October 20, 1855, in Montreal, and was educated at the seminary. He made his theological studies at Paris and Rome, and was ordained priest in Rome in 1878. On his return to Montreal he was appointed to a chair in Laval University. In 1887 he was honored with the dignity of canon of the cathedral of Montreal, and in the same year was appointed professor of apologetics at Laval. He was appointed successor to the late Archbishop Fabre, June 25, 1897.

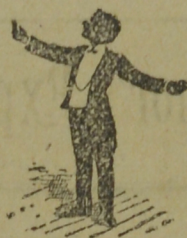

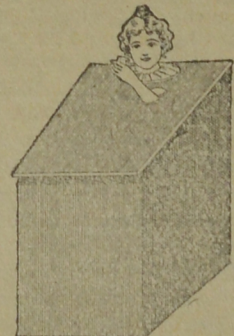
