

SHOTS AT THE KING

Italian Discharged Revolver Three Times

AT HIS MAJESTY OF BELGIUM

As He Proceeded to Service at the Cathedral.

INCIDENT CREATED A GREAT SENSATION.

Brussels, Nov. 15.—Three shots were fired at the King of the Belgians this morning while His Majesty was proceeding to the cathedral to attend a te deum in memory of the late Queen Marie Henriette. No one was hurt.

The shots were fired by an Italian who stood on the steps of the bank of Brussels. He was immediately arrested.

The rest of the cartridges proved to be blank, and it is believed those fired were equally harmless.

The incident created a great sensation.

MR. HUBBARD'S MISSION
Engaged by C. P. R. to Lecture on Agricultural Topics in Maritime Provinces

Ottawa Nov. 15.—The first indication of the C. P. R.'s intention to spread education among the farmers of the Maritime Province develop the agricultural

resources and thus bring increased traffic to the road is seen in the engagement \$1,800 per annum of W. W. Hubbard, formerly editor of the Maritime Farmer and Secretary of the Maritime Stock Breeder's Association.
Mr. Hubbard will travel through the districts in the Maritime Provinces which are served by the C.P.R. and devote himself to lecturing and writing on the following subjects: (1) "Encouragement of live stock raising, especially cattle, with a view of trade in stockers." (2) "Apple growing, with a view of supplying the southwest trade." (3) "Potato growing for the West Indian market." (4) "Model road building near central stations."

PROSPECTIVE CHANGES

Halifax, Nov. 15.—A change in the personnel of the Government of Nova Scotia is likely soon to take place. It is probable that Hon. Angus McGillivray, now a member of the Executive Council, representing the eastern section of the Province, will be appointed Judge of the County Court succeeding the late Judge McIsaac of Antigonish, brother of Mr. Colin McIsaac, M. P. Mr. McGillivray's successor in the Government will probably be his colleague in the representation of Antigonish, Christopher Chisholm.

THE VANWART ESTATE

Report of Referee Coy Submitted to the Creditors' Counsel

A meeting to receive the report of Havelock Coy referee in equity in re the estate of the late Wesley Vanwart was held in Mr. Coy's office this afternoon. Those in attendance were:

J. H. Barry, K. C., C. E. A. Simonds, J. W. McCreedy, A. R. Slipp, R. W. McLellan and H. G. Fenety representing various creditors.

Referee Coy submitted a lengthy report, which contained among other things a list of accounts passed by him amounting in all to \$43,511.40. The total value of the personal estate available for creditors was given at \$35,586.64.

Among the accounts disallowed were those of Geo. Kitchen, Rebecca Palmer, W. W. Long, J. R. Howie, James Peppers, T. G. O'Connor and John Macpherson.

The total amount of the claims filed against the deceased as a member of the firm of J. A. and W. Vanwart was given at \$28,960.59.

It was shown that the total amount paid by deceased for premiums on life assurance was \$17,633.31.

The report of the referee will have to be confirmed by the judge in equity, at the December term of the court before it can be acted upon.

DR PARKIN AT OXFORD

London, Nov. 15.—Dr. G. R. Parkin, late principal of Upper Canada College Toronto, who is the academic manager of the Rhodes-Anglo scholarships has been addressing the Oxford Union, and predicting that one of the results of this educational scheme will be the establishment of organic connection between the university life of the mother country and the men of the future in the colonies. Imperial federation, he asserts, will be brought about when the young brain of the colonies are brought under the direct formative influence of Oxford.

Lived a Century.

The Orangeville Post says: There died in Alton on Oct. 10 Thomas Russell at the age of 100 years 4 months and 10 days. He was born near Edinburgh, Scotland, in May, 1802. He came to Canada in 1834 and settled near Alton. Mr. Russell was a man of more than ordinary ability and served his township at the green table, having been at one time reeve of Caledon. In 1826 he married Miss Thompson of Leith, Scotland. Of the fruit of this union four are still living: Hugh, Alton; George, on the homestead; Mrs. James Burns of Bolton, and Mrs. McKinnon, widow of the late Arch. McKinnon, and mother of ex-Reeve McKinnon of Caledon. The funeral, which took place to the Alton cemetery on Sunday afternoon, was the largest ever seen in that locality.

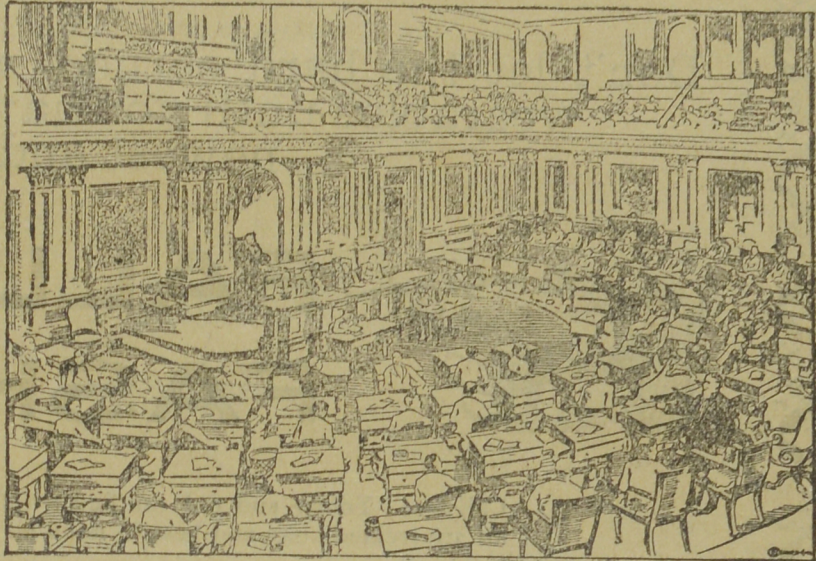
