St Dunstan's Mission

The mission services for women which Rev. Fathers Daly and Burke have been conducting here during the week will be concluded tomorrow afternoon at 3.30 o'clock. This service will consist of rosary, sermon, renewing of baptismal vows, Papal blessing, and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament, and continue all next week. The first of a series of sermons for men will commence at 7.30 in the evening. Services open to all will be held tomorrow morning at 7, 8.30, and 10.30 o'clock.

To Replace the Star.

D.J. Parry, M.P.P., and inspector Wm. Waring, who went to New York to inspect a steamship, to the interests of the People's Line, have communicated with the manager to the effect that the boat has been purchased and will start at once for St. John to go on the Washdemon route in place of the Star recently burned. The steamer is a side-wheeler, length about 135 feet, beam 30 feet, draught when loaded about six feet, speed 15 knots, and passenger capacity 700. The price is said to be between \$8,000 and \$9,000. She is about the tonnage of the burned Star, after which she will be named.

MISSIONARY WORK.

Very Successful Public Meeting at the Methodist Church.

A public meeting of the Women's Missionary Society was held in the lecture room of the Methodist church, with the president, Mrs. G. E. Coulthard, in the chair. Mrs. (Rev.) Rogers read a selection of Scripture, spoke encouragingly of the work of the society and urged increased effort on the part of all the ladies connected with the church. Mrs. (Rev.) Colter gave an interesting resume of the work of the annual Branch meeting recently held at Marys-

ville. The presence of Miss Wadmore returned missionary, the inspiration of the meetings, the munificence of Mr. Gibson and the kindness of the Marysville people, were all referred to. Mrs. W. B. Coulthard, the delegate to the general board meeting at Port Hope last month, gave a most interesting account of the sessions and made reference to several of the distinguished delegates. Rev. Mr. Hiram, who visited this city shortly after his conversion, fifteen years ago, was present and his description of the wonderful work carried on in Japan was heard with delight and encouragement. Before closing the exercises the president made a strong plea to all women of the church to undertake their share of responsibility in this great work. Miss Jennie Torrens presided at the piano and the exercises were closed with prayer by Rev. J. A. Rogers.

MR EMMERSON TALKS

Member for Westmorland on the Political Situation in New Brunswick

Toronto, Nov. 15.—Hon. H. R. Emmerson, who is in the city, when interviewed spoke enthusiastically of the affairs in his province. The development of mining resources, he said, was proceeding most satisfactorily.

Regarding rumors of an immediate provincial election in New Brunswick, Mr. Emmerson said: "I doubt very much if there will be any appeal to the people before the expiry of the term next spring. While I have nothing to do with it now, and cannot speak with authority, I would suppose there would be another session. As regards the issues of the fight when it does come, I think it will be largely a fight between the two parties. The opposition has developed Conservative tendencies. While they profess to have departed from the celebrated Moncton convention of the conservative party, which decided to run local politics on party lines, that departure, I think, is largely a profession. The present government's interests and those of the liberal party are almost identical. Personally I think it is a mistake to attempt to run a provincial government on Dominion party lines, although it may be all right from the party standpoint.

Speaking of the Dominion political situation, Mr. Emmerson said: "I think the changes are very satisfactory. All regret the retirement of Mr. Tarte, but it seems to be the natural sequence of events. At the same time I think he enjoys the respect of all, even in his retirement. The maritime provinces regret also the translation of Mr. Sutherland to the public works department. His administration of the marine, and fisheries department which touches us closely, was very satisfactory and we look forward to Mr. Prefontaine, who I think, will prove very satisfactory to Quebec, following the policy of his predecessor. As regards the tariff I think any action which may be taken will be in accordance with the well defined policy of the government, and will not be accentuated by the action of any individual member. As far as the maritime provinces are concerned, I think the feeling there is for a revenue tariff. I think they are satisfied to leave well enough alone.

The country was never more prosperous. Manufacturers can scarcely meet the demands."

SUPREME COURT.

Judgment in a Number of Cases Delivered This Morning.

Judgment in the following cases was delivered by the Supreme Court this morning:

Harris vs. Jameson—Court being equally divided the verdict stands.

Ex parte Edgett—Motion to rescind order of chief justice refused.

Rideout vs. Tibbitts—The Chief Justice delivers judgment refusing rule for judgment as in a case of a non-suit.

Cormier vs. Bondreau—Motion to rescind refused without costs.

Atkinson vs. Grieves—Judge McLeod directed to refuse the certificate.

Cormier vs. Dominion Atlantic Railway Company—Rule absolute for a non-suit. Judges Hanington and Landry no part.

The case of Wood vs. LeBlanc, which was taken up by the court yesterday, is still going on. The evidence of John W. Patterson, Chas. Roberts, Harris Calhoun, Thomas Calhoun and Michael Riley was taken yesterday afternoon and James Friel testified this morning. The attorney general is now showing cause why the motion for a new trial should not be allowed.

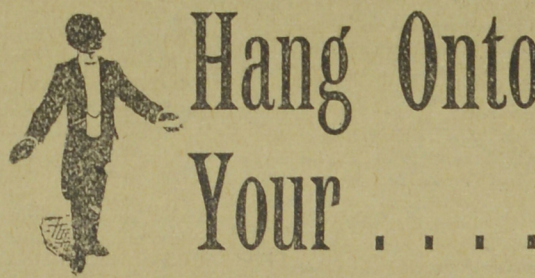
