BUSY BRANDON.

A Typical Town on the Canadian Prairie.

ITS BRIGHT FUTURE.

Already the Centre of Many Industries.

(Cor. Toronto Globe.)

Brandon, April 13.—“Keep along Ross-er avenue to Eighteenth street and you will find the road leading down to the Assinaboine.”

“Sounds rather New Yorky, doesn't it?”

“Yes,” admitted the Brandon man; “it may be better to tell you that Eighteenth can be recognized by the fact that the sidewalk does not run any farther out on the south side of the avenue.”

Now, Eighteenth street was not any make-believe. It was simply another example of the wonderful faith of the westerner. So far as Brandon is concerned, although at the moment it has slightly less than six thousand people, the day is coming when Eighteenth street will be a thickly built thoroughfare. The situation of the city is an admirable one. It lies on the southern bank of the Assinaboine, on a fairly steep slope, with admirable drainage facilities and a wide outlook upon the ridge to the north of the valley, the most conspicuous features upon which are the fine brick buildings of the provincial asylum and of the Indian school. Through the valley, amid a thick growth of bush and poplar, sweeps the Assinaboine to its junction with the Red River in Winnipeg, 132 miles to the east.

Brandon people are proud of their town and of the progress it has made in the twenty years since the first settlement was planted on the river bank. A few old-timers there are who were here earlier, the scouts and pioneers of civilization, but the first real attempt to found a town was made in 1882. Several shacks on the sloping hillside and a good many tent hotels, with high-sounding names and canvas that was not too tight, constituted the Brandon of that first rush. What have we today in this centre of mid-western Manitoba? First, there are railways that radiate in all directions like the spokes of a wheel and make Brandon the chief centre of retail trade between Winnipeg and the mountains. There are hundreds of pretty wooden homes and dozens of brick and stone mansions nestling among their shrubbery of spruce and their shade trees of Manitoba maple. There are churches such as we would not expect to see in Ontario centres of less importance than Brantford, St. Catharines or Guelph. There are retail dry goods and general stores that are a revelation to the visitor as showing the buying capacity of the people who support them. There are sawmills using logs cut away up the Assinaboine. There is a flourishing mill, a big machine shop and foundry, a binder twine factory, and in many other departments the beginning of manufacturing. Brandon has a good college with over 100 students. It is a divisional point of the C. P. R., having a resident superintendent and train despatchers and round-houses. Wholesale and manufacturers are making Brandon more and more a distributing point, the Canadian Northern and C. P. R. competing here for traffic. A large part of the mercantile business, especially in dry goods, is done for cash, and the result is careful buying and bright new stocks.

A settler came in twenty-six years ago with nothing but courage and the beginnings of a large family. That man and his children own over a hundred thousand dollars today, all made out of the soil. Four sons have a half section each within five miles of the father's original location. Two more are beginning work on a section up in the Dauphin country. A daughter is happily married within a mile or two of home. Children and grandchildren all about them, all happy, all beyond the reach of poverty. After church on Sunday the old folk's yard looks like the yard of a hotel at fair time with the rigs of the assembled children. There were early hardships, especially for the mother of that family, but if its lot had been cast in a crowded

old country city, her sons would be separated from her by all the oceans of the earth, one in Australia, perhaps, one in India, another at the Cape, and still another in Canada. Here all are almost within hail of each other, and when the father closes his eyes it will be as Jacob did, with his children and his children's children round him.

Two other examples of success were picked up in Brandon. One is that of a young lad who came in 1882 as a clerk in a dry goods store for \$35 a month, and worked away steadily till he got a start for himself. He owns probably \$50,000 worth of Brandon real estate and other investments, has a splendid business and is still a comparatively young man.

Another of the leading business men used to work at the bench in a little shop down in Haldimand County, scarcely making enough to keep the wolf from the door. He is at the head of a profitable and fast expanding business, and lives in one of the show places of the residential quarter, and will build a big new store this year, paying cash for it.

THE CLIMATE OF DAWSON.

A somewhat broken series of observations at Dawson and various other places in Yukon Territory between 1895-1898 and a continuous series at Dawson during the past three years, afford data for estimating with a fair degree of accuracy the average climate conditions of the Klondike.

The average annual mean temperature is about 22°; the mean of the three summer months is about 57°, July being 61°; and of three winter months 16°, with January, 23°. Spring may be said to open towards the end of April, the last zero temperature of the winter usually occurring about the 5th of this month. May with an average temperature of 41° is by no means an unpleasant month and the 23rd is the average date of the last frost of spring. Daily observations during five summers indicate that on the average the temperature rises to 70° or higher on 46 days and to 80° in Dawson in June 1899 and 95 in July of the same year. These temperatures with much sunshine and an absence of frost during three months together with the long days of a latitude within a few degrees of the Arctic circle amply account for the success so far achieved by market gardeners near Dawson, in growing a large variety of garden produce including lettuce, radish, cabbage, cauliflower and potatoes, and warrant the belief that the hardier cereals might possibly be a successful crop both in parts of Yukon Territory and in the far northern districts of the Mackenzie River Basin. August 23, would appear to be the average date of the first autumnal frost, the temperature rapidly declining towards the close of this month. Although night frosts are not infrequent in September, the month as a whole is mild, with a mean temperature of 42°. October may be fairly termed as a winter month, the mean temperature being but 22.5°, and the first zero of winter recorded on the average about the 18th. Ice usually begins to run in the Yukon about the second week but it is not until quite the end of the month or early in November that the river is frozen fast. The temperature on the average during a winter falls to 20° below zero, or lower, on 72 days; to 40° below or lower on 21 days; to 50° below or lower on 7 days; and to 60° below or lower on 2 days. In January, 1896, 65° below was registered at Fort Constantine, and in January, 1901, 68° below was recorded at Dawson.

STRUGGLING IN THE WATER.

Narrow Escape of Schooner Pearl Evelyn, Capsized in a Squall off Halifax Harbor.

The Nova Scotia fishing schooner Pearl Evelyn was capsized nine miles off Halifax harbor last week and Captain Himelman and crew of fifteen men were thrown struggling into the water. The schooner had all her sails set and was beating towards the entrance of the harbor when a sudden squall from the northwest struck her and before the sails could be reduced, she went over. All hands were on deck at the time and they were precipitated into the water. Some of the crew became entangled in the rigging and sails and they had a thrilling experience for a few moments. The vessel however floated on her side and the men managed to cling to her until assistance came. The accident was witnessed by four fishermen who were on the shore at Herring Cove and they quickly manned their boats and rowed out, but before they reached the vessel a small schooner from Sambro bore down on her and took the crew off.

The steamer Aid, which was working at the wreck of the steamer Grecian went out and took the capsized craft in tow and held onto her until another tug was sent down from the city.

The Pearl Evelyn is a schooner of 110 tons and was bound from LaHave to Halifax to fit out for a fishing trip to the banks.

The action of the Belgian Cabinet in opposing a plebiscite on the question of universal suffrage is not likely to promote harmony in that kingdom or allay the popular excitement which is rapidly growing into revolutionary sentiment. The Socialists appear to be very strong in that country, universal suffrage is one of their strongest demands, and if it is denied even consideration, the natural result, at such a time as this, is likely to be a desperate fight for it.

In the interchanges between the Boers and the British Ministers the King is proving the most insistent agency for peace. His anxiety to close the war before his coronation accounts for his frequent consultations with his Ministers. It is largely due to his influence that the Ministers, though nominally insisting upon unconditional surrender, now take the Boers acceptance of complete annexation as a basis for the informal discussion recently proceeding at Pretoria.

An echo of the fight made by the liquor men of the West against prohibition was heard Saturday morning when it was announced that a boycott would be placed on the big eastern wholesale cigar firms, particularly two in Montreal, who failed upon request to contribute to the fund raised to defeat the cold water men. The liquor dealers claim cigar men were as much interested as they in keeping the saloons running.
