CROWD MYSTIFIED

Thought a Patent Flying Machine Was to be Tested.

GAZED ANXIOUSLY SKYWARD.

Excitement Caused by Fun-Making Lawyer Watching a Fiercely Contested Sparrow Fight.

PREACHED A SERMON

From a Text of Ralph Connor's the Noted Canadian Author.

"I haven't much of a creed; but I do know that good is good, and bad is bad, and good and bad are not the same. And I know that a man is a fool to follow the one and a wise man to follow the other, and God is at the back of the man who wants to get done with bad."

These words, taken from one of the works of the distinguished Canadian author, Ralph Connor, were the text of a thoughtful, scholarly and exceedingly practical sermon by Rev. George Jackson, of Edinburgh, in St. James Methodist Church, Montreal, Sunday evening.

Mr. Jackson is a pleasing speaker, and there is a freshness about his way of expressing himself that is very attractive. In introducing his sermon he read three passages of scripture, Is. 5, 20; Is. 3, 10; and Gal. 5, 17; but his real text was the above quotation from "Black Rock." The prominent Scottish divine, in announcing

it, took occasion to pay a sincere compliment to the successful painter of modern Canadian life. He said that he could not speak of the accuracy of the pictures portrayed, but he was impressed with the manly spirit of Ralph Connor's books. They rang true, and he believed that they would make for moral health wherever read. Avowedly religious, they were yet entirely free from mawkishness or cant.

Continuing the speaker said that some might not think this was much of a creed. But the great test of a creed was not how long it was but how living. Some might say it was too elementary to be of any use when compared with the rich, full creed of the New Testament. But it should not be forgotten that many, not carefully trained in the truth, would only become bewildered if they attempted to take in the whole of Christian teaching at once.

This creed, however, was not the barren truism it might seem. Christianity lays a stress upon the duality in man, the line of distinction between right and wrong. In the words "Good is good, and bad is bad, and good and bad are not the same," is the foundation of all morality.

"Are not many of us giving in to pitiful sophisms in confusing right and wrong? Do we not let loose the beast within us, and then say that we are only following nature? Do we not give in to selfish greed and excuse ourselves by calling it enlightened self-interest? Do not some of us call the voice of conscience merely the echo of a narrow Puritan ancestry?"

"Young men let us hold fast in life to the distinction between right and wrong. I do not mean that everything our fathers thought wrong is wrong, and that everything they thought right was right. But the dividing line is there just the same. Follow conscience and distrust reason."

"A man is a fool to follow the one, and a wise man to follow the other," continued the preacher, quoting the second part of his text. When we see how the wicked seem to prosper, we wonder if God is with the righteous. Nevertheless if we take large views of life, we find that it is true. And the most effective argument is the direct appeal to conscience.

But the last clause of the quotation was the most important of all. It was that which distinguished Christianity from all other systems of morality.

"God is at the back of a man who wants to get done with bad."

So far we had been merely listening to the voice of conscience. Now we were to listen to the voice of God in Christ. If we did not believe in God, sin would be too strong for us. We read of the sin which doth easily beset us. But we also read, "Thou, O God, besettest me." If there is a pull downward there is also a pull upward. Christianity is power. The Gospel is many things, but above all it is the "power" of God and salvation.

The world says, "God helps those who help themselves." If I believed that, I would never go into a pulpit again. God helps those who cannot help themselves. "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." Let no man except himself from this. God can do nothing for any man that he cannot do for every man. If we only turn to Him He will make this gospel the power of God unto salvation.
