A TORONTO LIBELLER.

Mr. John A. Cooper, who as editor of the Canadian Magazine on a former occasion libelled the people of the Maritime Provinces, is pleased to observe in the October number of his publication: "It is the mental attitude of the people of the Maritime Provinces which makes their progress slow. There are many energetic business men in Halifax and St. John, but, speaking generally, the people are not up to the average of the North American continent in progressiveness and aggressiveness."

Mr. Cooper is an ignoramus and should muzzle himself. The Maritime Provinces have produced the brightest men in Canada, in all lines of human activity. We have given Canada two of its six premiers since confederation, its ablest educationalists in the late Dr. Grant and Dr. Parkin, and many of its leading lawyers, doctors, preachers and business men.

Mr. Cooper will not gain popularity for his magazine by assailing so wantonly the people of the Maritime Provinces.

A DISTINGUISHED REPORTER.

The local opposition leader in his younger days was connected with the press, served as legislative reporter and has evidently not forgotten his knowledge of the business. The reports of the Gagetown opposition convention in the St. John Globe and Star are well written, if highly colored, and are quite worthy of Mr. Hazen's facile pen. And the funny part of it is, the reports are identical.

The Sun's report of the Barton meeting strongly resembled Mr. Hazen's style, so that our opposition contemporaries are to be congratulated on having added a distinguished politician to their reportorial staffs. The reports which Mr. Hazen writes of his own meetings however are likely to be rather one sided, and the public should be rather chary in accepting them as truly representing the gatherings.

ONE LITTLE BRIGHT SPOT.

The Quebec Conservatives won two local bye-elections yesterday in Stanstead and Soulanges, and Mr. Flynn's following in the assembly is increased to seven members, in a house of seventy-three, or less than one tenth of that body. Mr. Hazen has six followers in a house of forty-six, and in the Nova Scotia assembly there are only three oppositionists. Evidently the governments of Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia need have no fear of want of confidence motions. Think of it, in the three legislatures of 157 members there are only 17 oppositionists. Hard days these for Toryism.

The Sun is telling the Liberals of Queens that they should vote against life long Liberals like Hon. L. P. Farris and I. W. Carpenter M. P.'s, but the advice will be resented. The Liberals of that constituency have not forgotten the seat stealing episode of the Tory regime, and they remember that it was the Sun clique who were responsible for Mr. King being denied his rights in the matter.

When our esteemed friend Mr. Geo. W. Fowler, M. P., for Kings, left on his western tour with Mr. Borden he was ranked as major in the opposition newspapers, but in a recent publication we see him referred to as "Col." Fowler.apid promotion.

Another Canadian has received an appointment from the British government. John Patterson of Thamesford, Ontario, who was successful in capturing a scholarship at Cambridge University, has been chosen as a professor and president of one of the colleges in India. He will leave for that distant land about the first of November. A salary of \$3,000 goes with the position.

Mr. Hazen's friends are starting early in a campaign of misrepresentation. At Burton Mr. Macinerney declared that Mr. Hazen had the backing of the Moccasin Transcript which is not correct, and now the St. Croix Courier intimates that the St. Andrews Beacon has united with the opposition, a palpable and stupid falsehood.

The painful admission must be made that the disastrous coal strike is as far from settlement as ever, although President Roosevelt has used his good offices towards bringing an end to the difficulty.

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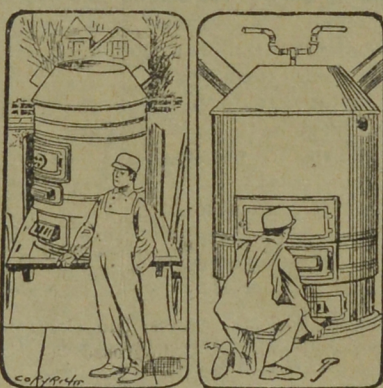
