The Stolen Rig.

Mr. Ran Foster, manager of Golding's livery stable, received word last night that a rig corresponding to the one stolen from his stable on July 1st was seen by several different parties down river, and their description tallies exactly with that of the lost rig. Jarvis Estabrooks, of McGowan's Landing, saw the rig go by there in the afternoon and later the same team with two men in it crossed the Jemseg ferry and enquired the way to the hotel at Cumberland Bay, Grand Lake, at which place they arrived Tuesday night, having driven 45 miles during the afternoon. They also told parties there that they had driven from Fredericton that afternoon. There are at present four stolen rigs driving through this province somewhere. Two disappeared from Moncton on July 1st.

THE KING'S RECOVERY.

Coronation Now Talked of for August 9.

London, July 11.—It is said on good authority that subject to the approval of King Edward's physicians the coronation will take place August 9.

King Edward is not yet able to sit up, but every day he is removed to an adjustable couch, which gives a welcome change to his position and enables him to read with some degree of comfort.

It is understood that next week he may be transferred upon his couch to the royal yacht, the Victoria and Albert, in a specially constructed ambulance carriage, but that all the arrangements for this transfer are kept secret to prevent a gathering of the public to witness the king's departure.

His majesty maintains his steady improvement.

Truth says that when the coronation is held only the royal family, a few relatives from abroad and the permanent ambassadors in London, representing foreign countries will be present. There will be a procession from Buckingham Palace to Westminster Abbey and back, and nothing else. The function will be limited to the actual day of the coronation.

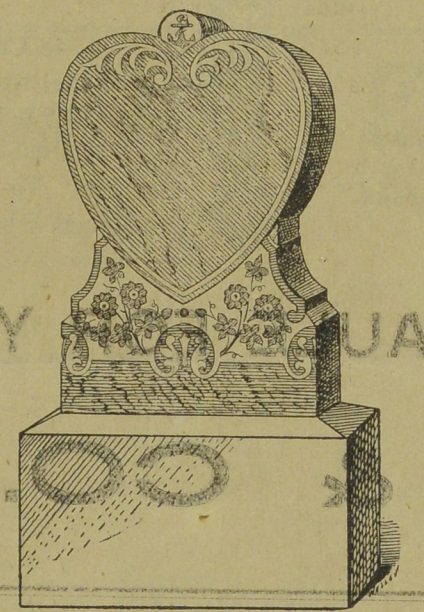

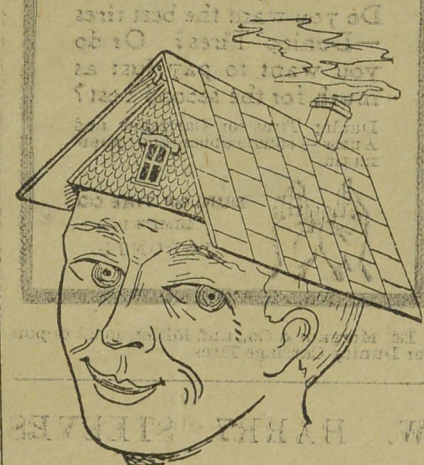
