AWFUL RAILWAY WRECK

many of the pinioned passengers were severely burned.

KRUPP'S LEGACIES.

CONFESSED A MURDER

Montreal, Nov. 28.—Jack Frazer, formerly of Montreal, is on trial for his life in San Francisco on a charge of being the murderer of a policeman named Robinson, whose killing created a great sensation in that city. Now he has confessed to the murder. He was known to many in this city, where he resided for some years. He worked in the office of a prominent firm of lawyers, and was afterwards a clerk in the service of Detective Corpenier, when he was at the head of the Canadian Secret Service.

ROOM FOR BOTH.

Ottawa, Nov. 28.—Premier Haultain, of the Northwest Territories, when asked if he thought the west could stand two transcontinental railways, replied:

"I believe that at the end of five years, if there were two transcontinental railways, they would have all the grain they could carry, that is so far as the Territories are concerned. At present there is a serious blockade and the farmers are accordingly losing 10 cents a bushel on their grain. I have letters from the west complaining that buyers have taken advantage of the situation and reduced the price 10 cents a bushel below what it is at Fort William."

NOW SUBJECTS OF THE KING

Tacoma, Washington, Nov. 28.—Four hundred foreigners who were Americans, were naturalized at Dawson during the month preceding Nov. 15, when the registration books closed. These naturalizations were in preparation for the coming three elections in Yukon Territory. The first and most bitterly contested of all occurs next Tuesday, when Yukon Territory will elect its first member of the Dominion Parliament, with Gov. Ross and Edward Clark in the field as candidates. The campaign has become so warm Americans cannot help taking sides, and have accordingly sworn allegiance to King Edward VII. that they may vote for their favorite candidate.
