

## DEATH CLAIMED HIM.

Charles Davenport Passes Away at the Victoria Hospital.

Charles Davenport, the well known shoemaker, whose critical illness was referred to in these columns yesterday, passed away at the Victoria Hospital at six o'clock last evening. On Tuesday he underwent an operation for cancer, at the hands of Dr. Atherton, who found it necessary to remove the greater part of his tongue. The following day he contracted pneumonia which developed very rapidly and was the cause of his demise. The deceased was a native of Davenport Hall, Cheshire, England, his father having been steward of a large estate owned by Col. Tapping. He learned the shoemaker's trade when quite young and afterwards enlisted in the Grenadier Guards, filling the position of master shoemaker to that famous regiment for over ten years. He came to Fredericton twenty-one years ago and entered the employ of Nathaniel Sutherland, having previously worked in Boston for several years. For the past five or six years he has been carrying on business on his own account on Queen street, below the Queen Hotel. As a shoemaker he was second to none in the province, and his work commanded the highest prices.

The late Mr. Davenport was of a genial and social disposition, and had many old friends in the city to whom news of his death, under such sad circumstances, was a painful shock. He was 66 years of age and is survived by a widow, his second wife, but no children.

The deceased was a prominent member of Islington Lodge, of the Sons of England, and the funeral will take place under the auspices of that organization on Sunday at two p. m. There will be services at the Cathedral and interment will be made at Forest Hill. Undertaker John G. Adams has charge of the arrangements.

## VISITING HIS OLD HOME

Lieut Col Campbell of the Royal Horse Artillery in the City

Lieut. Col. Herbert Montgomery Campbell, formerly of this city, but now an officer in the Imperial army, arrived here last evening, accompanied by his brother, Lieut. Col. Henry Montgomery Campbell of Apohaqui, and they are the guests of E. Byron Winslow. Lieut. Col. Campbell, who is a graduate of the Royal Military College at Kingston, is at present in command of "U" Battery of the Royal Horse Artillery, one of the crack corps of the British army, and saw considerable active service in South Africa during the late war. His battery was ordered to the front at the beginning of hostilities, and took part in a number of important engagements, and was badly cut up by the Boers on one occasion, suffering the loss of seven guns and a number of horses and men. It is some years since the Colonel last visited his former home here, and it is needless to say he is receiving a very hearty greeting from his numerous friends, who are pleased to see him looking so well. The visitors are sons of the late Prof. Montgomery-Campbell, for many years professor in classics at the University of New Brunswick.

## RECRUITING IN SWITZERLAND

Major D I V Eaton Contracted Physical Trouble in South Africa

Says the *Truro Daily News*: Mrs. R. B. Eaton's Truro friends will be pleased to hear that she has arrived in safety at her home in South Africa. On the 25th of March 1901, Miss Violet May Gordon was married in Toronto, to Lieut. (now Capt.) R. B. Eaton, S. A. C., he leaving immediately for South Africa. In company with friends, Mrs. and Miss Fitz-Randolph, of Fredericton, Mrs. (Major) D. I. V. Eaton, and baby, Helen, forming a family party, she sailed in July from Montreal, on board the S. S. Pretorian, for England, whence she proceeded to Cape Town, where she was met by Capt. Eaton, S. A. C. They went by rail to Bloemfontein, and from there in a Cape cart to Lady Brand, where Capt. Eaton is stationed.

On arrival in England, Mrs. D. I. V. Eaton found Major Eaton in the hospital, afflicted with lung trouble, brought about by exposure in the South African war. After stopping three weeks in the hospital, he was invalided, and given six months' leave of absence, and is at present recruiting his health in Montreux, Switzerland, where the air is supposed to be the best possible for him in his present state of health.

## A HEAVY VERDICT.

## DYNAMITED A BANK

The first intimation of the presence of the gang, believed to be three in number, was when a loud explosion was heard. ## BANK BURGLARS FOILED

The robbers captured and bound the two night telephone operators and cut all telephone wires leading out of the telephone exchange. They bound and gagged a physician, whose office is in the same block with the bank.

The first explosion of dynamite at the bank roused the citizens, who hastened to the scene with fire arms. Many shots were exchanged, but the robbers escaped without booty. The bank building was badly wrecked.
