The Late Skipton Rossborough Was a Man Much Respected and is Sincerely Mourned

FORMER YORK WOMAN

Seeking Divorce From Her Husband in Maine.

Mrs. Etta Cunningham, who was married to George W. Cunningham, of York county, at Southampton, New Brunswick, 24 years ago, has filed a libel for divorce against her husband before James Archibald, justice of the peace, in Arcootook county, Me., the advertisement of which appears in the Arcootook Pioneer.

Mrs. Cunningham now lives in Monticello, Me. She claims that she deported herself toward her husband at all times since her marriage, as a true and affectionate wife. They lived together in New Brunswick until June, 1900, when they moved to Orono, Me., and in September of the following year Mrs. Cunningham says her husband deserted her, that she cannot ascertain his whereabouts, and that he has not contributed to her support since leaving her. She further claims that while she lived with him he abused her to such an extent that her health suffered. Mrs. Cunningham requests that her name be changed to Etta Jewett. The case will be considered by the supreme court at Caribou.
