The Boston Show.

C. Fred Chestnut, president of the Fredericton Tourist Association, has received an invitation to attend the private opening of the Boston Sportsmen's Show on the evening of February 21st.

Wall Paper Galore.

The largest consignment of wall paper ever received in this city by one concern arrived on Saturday for McMurray & Co. The lot comprised 151 bales, containing in all about fifty thousand rolls.

Intercollegiate Debate.

The students of the U. N. B. and Mount Allison have arranged to hold a joint debate at Sackville on the evening of March 14th. The subject to be debated is "Resolved that trusts are beneficial to a community," and there will be three speakers on each side.

For Railway Bridges.

The hard pine for the bridges on the New Brunswick Coal and Railway Company's railway has arrived in St. John. This will be employed by the J. Barnes Construction Company Ltd. Whitman Brewer has the contract for building the Salmon River bridge.

Mission Sunday.

Yesterday was mission Sunday in the Methodist church and large congregations attended both services. Rev. Dr. Chapman preached in the morning and Rev. J. J. Teasdale in the evening, when communion service was also held and nine persons were admitted to membership in the church.

Injured by Dynamite.

Austin Scott and W. H. Smith, employees of Willard Kitchen, were badly injured by an explosion of dynamite at Grand View, P. E. I., a few days ago. Scott had his right hand taken off at the wrist and Smith was struck on the head by a piece of wreckage. Both men belong to New Brunswick.

Basket Ball League.

A basket ball league, comprising teams representing the U. N. B. Normal School, Gymnasium, Tartars and city was formed at a meeting in the Y. M. C. A. Gymnasium on Saturday evening. It was arranged to have two matches a week, the first to be played tomorrow evening. A small admission of five cents will be charged to see the games.

C. P. R. Changes.

A. J. Heath, for years district passenger agent of the Canadian Pacific railway, with headquarters at St. John, has been transferred to an important post in the offices of C. E. Usher, general passenger agent at Montreal, and C. B. Foster, the popular clerk in the St. John passenger department, has been promoted to the vacancy thus created.

Had Enough of it.

The time for filing a protest against Mr. Gibson's return as the representative for York in the House of Commons expired on Thursday of last week, and it is scarcely necessary to state that no protest was filed. Known in Fredericton.

Captain Cheyne, R. N., who was present as an officer with three Arctic expeditions in search of Sir John Franklin, died at Halifax Sunday in his 75th year. Besides his polar experience he was with the British blockading fleet in the White Sea during the Crimean war. Commander Cheyne was well known in F'ton, having when a young man resided here with his parents for a number of years. His father was an officer in the Royal Navy, and occupied a house situated on the spot where Danrobin Castle now stands. Commander Cheyne delivered lectures here on more than one occasion on his Arctic explorations.

Mrs. Hillock's Death.

Mrs. Hillock, relict of the late William Hillock, whose illness has already been referred to in these columns, passed away at Gibson on Saturday evening. She was 82 years of age and is survived by one son Rev. S. B. Hillock, rector of Andover, and two daughters, Mrs. B. H. Babbitt of Gibson and Mrs. Carruthers of Blackville. The deceased lady formerly resided at Bathurst. The funeral took place at two o'clock this afternoon, Rev. Mr. Robertson officiating. Interment was made at Lower St. Mary's. John G. Adams, undertaker.

His Father Dead.

Capt. Lister, adjutant of the R. C. R., received a telegram from Toronto, yesterday, informing him of the sudden death at that place of his father, Mr. Justice Lister, of the Ontario Court of Appeals. The deceased gentleman who was 58 years of age, had been ailing for some time, but his condition was not looked upon as serious and the end news was a great shock to Capt. Lister. He left for Toronto by this afternoon's train to attend the funeral.

TRAIN DERAILED.

Serious Accident to I.C.R.
Fast FreightJUMPED THE RAILS NEAR MEM-
RAMCOOK THIS MORNING.Engine, Tender and Eleven
Cars off the Irons.

Moncton, Feb. 10.—A serious accident happened on the I. C. R. between Calhoun's mills and Memramcook this morning about 9 o'clock.

It appears that as the fast freight, No. 76, was running between the stations named, an accident happened to the tender of the engine which jumped the track, and as a consequence eleven freight cars were derailed.

The cause of the accident is unknown but is attributed to either a broken rail or a broken wheel.

An auxiliary car was sent out from Moncton and the broken cars were ditched and the track cleared by two o'clock this afternoon.

The smashup is a bad one, but fortunately no one was hurt. The C. P. R. from the east will be delayed four hours.
