A LOCAL CASE**Now Being Argued Before the Supreme Court**

The case of the People's Bank of Halifax vs. R. A. Estey was taken up in the supreme court yesterday afternoon, and argument was not finished when the court adjourned at noon today. The Attorney General and A. J. Gregory, K.C., are moving for a non suit or leave to enter a verdict for the defendant; A. B. Connell and F. B. Carvell, contra. The case was tried at the York Circuit court in June last before Judge Landry, without a jury and judgment was given in favor of the bank for \$2700. The action was brought to recover the price of quantity logs purchased by Mr. Estey from C.F. McKendrick in 1900 and paid for by him. The bank authorities had previously sold the logs to McKendrick and claim that there was a reservation of title in their favor. The ground on which Mr. Estey is appealing is that the bank authorities were estopped from having any claim on the lumber, and also that they had named the conditions of payment on delivery. It is said that there is a possibility of the case being carried to the Supreme Court of Canada.

Signs of Winter.

The first snow storm of the season set in at an early hour this morning and has continued the greater part of the day. Up to noon about two inches of the beautiful had fallen. There is very good bottom and it looks as if sleighing would be in order before long. Last year there was a light fall of snow on the night of Nov. 13th, but there was no sleighing until the 25th. Ice formed in the river last year on the night of the 11th, and the Steamer Victoria was obliged to put out at six o'clock next morning. Navigation did not close however for some days later.

Police Court.

A young man named David Owens was before the police court this morning, charged with throwing a bag of flour at one Robert McKenzie, a colored man, on Hallowe'en. The evidence disclosed that there were others mixed up in the affair, and Col. Marsh decided to defer judgment. In the meantime he will consider whether or not he will have the others brought up.

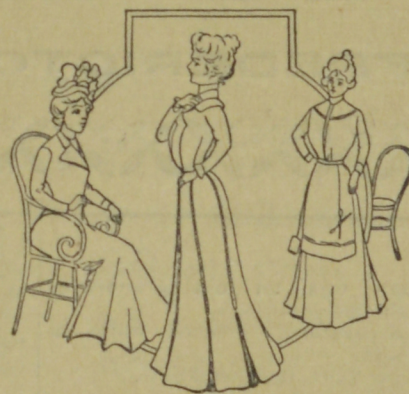
