Death at Beaver Dam.

The death occurred at Beaver Dam, New Maryland, yesterday after a short illness of brain fever, of Leonard Nason, a well known resident of that place. He was 40 years of age, and is survived by a widow, but no children. Undertaker Robert B. Adams has charge of the arrangements for the funeral which will take place tomorrow.

Government Meeting.

The local government held a meeting last evening, all the members being present except Premier Tweedie. Nothing outside of routine business was transacted. VERY SUDDEN DEATH

Of Mrs Thomas Sanson of Nashwaaksis

Mrs Thomas Sanson, died very suddenly at her home at Nashwaaksis last night. She had been about the house as usual during the day, and retired in the evening apparently in good health. During the night she was taken very ill and passed away in a very short time. Heart failure is supposed to have been the cause of death. She was 76 years of age, and is survived by one son, William of Nashwaaksis, and two daughters, Mrs. M. A. Kelly of Doaktown, and Mrs. T. G. Simms of Hartland. William Richards of Boiestown, is a brother-in-law of the deceased. The husband of the deceased died in the month of July last. The funeral will take place at 2 p. m. tomorrow with interment at the Pickard burying ground. Undertaker R. B. Adams has charge of the arrangements.

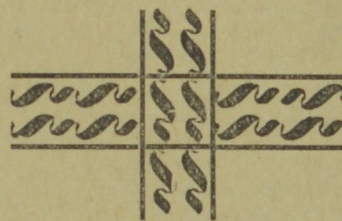
