

THE MURDER TRIAL.

Higgins on the Stand Again Today.

CROSS-EXAMINED BY MR. McKEOWN PRISONER HOLDS TO HIS STORY.

Spoke Cautiously and Maintained a Steady Nerve.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

St. John, Sept. 20.—Higgins was in the witness box all the morning.

He was cross-examined by Mr. McKeown the entire time and remained firm to his story that Goodspeed shot Doherty.

His statements about their visit to the park on the fatal Friday afternoon were not in any way contradicted, but of the visit to Brownville, Me., he was tripped in several details.

From Higgins' story he was in the confidence of a gang of youthful burglars, but not directly connected with any robbery.

Holm and Doherty, whom he went with to Maine, carried clubs to defend themselves from hoboos, but he carried none. He said he was on hand when the spoils were divided.

Further disclosures regarding recent burglaries were made in which Higgins said he knew a place near the city where the gang hid meat they stole from a butcher shop.

Higgins denied stating to boys in the graveyard that Holm was a fool for not shooting the policeman who arrested him.

The prisoner spoke cautiously and has so far kept a steady nerve. He is on the stand again this afternoon undergoing cross examination.

SUPREME COURT JUDGE DEAD.

Justice Fountain Passed Away Quite Suddenly at Sorel.

Montreal, Sept. 20.—News reached the city today of the death at Sorel, this morning, of Justice S. E. Fountain, of the superior court for the district of Richelieu.

His Lordship had been ailing for a couple of days but his death comes altogether unexpectedly.

Mr Justice Fountain was a native of St Hyacinthe, where he resided and practiced law for many years. He also took a prominent part in politics in district for a number of years. On the death of Mr. Justice J. Alphonse Osimet, a little over a year ago, he was raised to the bench.

FROM THE ARCTIC REGIONS.

St John, Sept. 20.—Several cages of live animals brought from the Arctic regions by Lieut. Perry, the famous explorer, reached here from Sydney this morning, enroute to New York, and were forwarded to the United States by the Boston express. The list included a musk ox calf, a walrus, a pair of raccoons, an Arctic rabbit and two of the Esquimaux dogs used by Peary on his expedition over the ice in search of the north pole. The unique collection attracted much attention from passengers and others about the railway station. The musk ox which is about the size of a sheep, is said to be one of the only two animals of its kind in captivity.

SALISBURY BETTER.

CAMP SUSSEX.

Our Citizen Soldiers Concluded Their Annual Drill on Friday.

Capt. G. A. Murray and J. W. Howe with the details from Nos. 2. and 3 companies of the 71st arrived this morning by the 9.20 train from Sussex, where they have been performing annual training. Both officers and men declare that the camp was in many respects the most successful from the standpoint of the militia authorities ever held in Sussex, and that more practical knowledge was imparted to the troops than ever before. The weather, with the exception of the first day, was fine and warm, although there were heavy frosts on one or two nights, on which occasions the boys did not find the tents any too warm. The rations were of excellent quality and the messing arrangements for the non. coms. and men were much better than usual.

Yesterday afternoon the troops, including the Huzzars, were reviewed on the parade ground by Lieut. Col. Irving, the divisional commander. It was not generally known that there was to be such an event, consequently only a few spectators were present. The usual ceremonial evolutions were performed, after which Col. Irving made a speech thanking all ranks for the energy and zeal they had displayed and congratulating them on the splendid showing made. He wound up with an eloquent outburst on the greatness of Canada and the Empire, which was listened to with the closest attention by the troops. Afterwards he led in three lusty cheers for the King, which brought the proceedings to a close. The R. C. E. and remaining details of the 71st regiment left Sussex by special train at two o'clock this afternoon for home.

Major Sansom of Stanley, who commanded the 71st contingent, returned to the city yesterday, and is now on the way to the Miramichi woods with a party of American sportsmen.
