Edward Broome, vicar of Hurst, Berks, England, and Miss Margaret Harcourt Roe, daughter of Mr. Harcourt Roe, Retty Abbey, Hants, England, are to be married at the Cathedral here at 3.45 p.m., Monday, His Lordship Bishop Kingdon performing the ceremony. Mr. Broome and his bride, the former an old friend of the Bishop, will leave immediately for their home in England.

English Visitors.

Mr. and Mrs. Harcourt Roe and the Misses I. and M. Harcourt Roe of Hampshire, England, are stopping at Miss Allen's, Waterloo Row. They have been in New Brunswick since April, residing near Sussex, and expect to leave for England on Wednesday. They are here in connection with an interesting event which is to take place at the Cathedral Monday afternoon in which Miss Margaret Roe is to be one of the principals.

To Hunt Big Game.

A quartette of American sportsmen, composed of F. L. Smith, the borax king of San Francisco, E. L. Ransom and C. B. Zabriskie, of New York, and S. T. Mather, of Chicago, arrived here by the noon train en route to the Miramichi to hunt big game with William Griffin, of Stanley, as guide. They took dinner at the Barker House and went over the Canada Eastern this afternoon. All four gentlemen were out with Mr. Griffin last fall and had good success.

The Market.

A great deal of country produce was disposed of at the market this morning at prices which were apparently satisfactory from the farmers' standpoint. Apples were in slow demand at from 90 cents to \$1.50 per barrel; green gage plums brought 80 cents a peck, damson plums, 75 cents, potatoes \$1.00, per barrel, eggs 18 cents per dozen, lamb 6 and 8 cents, butter, 19 cents, ripe tomatoes 5 cents per pound, cabbages 4 cents each, crab apples, 50 cents a bushel, and green tomatoes 20 cents a peck.

Act of Vandalism.

Some miscreants found amusement last night in smashing windows of the new school house at Morrison's Mill. No less than seven panes of glass were broken by stones and other missiles hurled at them, and in addition two of the sashes were completely ruined. It is not yet known who committed the act of vandalism, but the trustees have the names of several young toughs who were seen in the vicinity during the evening, and some developments which may lead to arrests are looked for. If the guilty parties are

discovered it is not improbable that they will have good reason in future to engage in amusements less expensive than window smashing.

SMOKING CONCERT.

Sergeants of the 71st Entertained Friends at Camp Sussex.

The most enjoyable social event in connection with the militia camp at Sussex was a smoking concert given on Thursday evening by the sergeants and staff sergeants of the 71st York regiment in their marquee. TARTE STILL TALKS.

Resents Globe's Insinuation that He Travels in Search of Expenditures.

WITH DRAMATIC EFFECT HE DECLARED "HIS HANDS WERE CLEAN."

Orillia, Ont., Sept. 20.—Hon. Mr. Tarte speaking here last night, repudiated the Toronto Globe's insinuation that he was travelling in search of expenditures.

"Thank God my hands are clean," he added, and pointed out that though the public accounts committee had been practically sitting on him and him only for six years, they had found nothing on which to form an accusation.

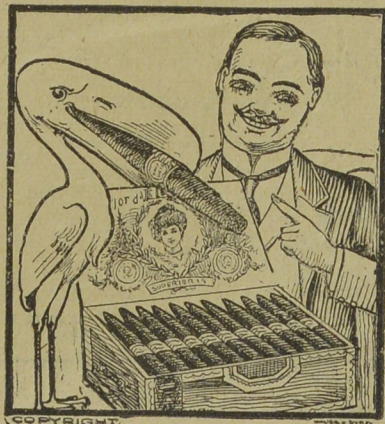
