A LIBERAL VICTORY.

Richardson Turned Down in Lisgar—Tory Candidate Loses His Deposit.

Winnipeg, Feb. 18.—Stewart (government candidate) was elected in Lisgar by about a thousand majority over Richardson, who leads Toombs, (conservative) by 300.

Winnipeg, Feb. 18.—In the Lisgar dominion by-election today, 70 polls heard from out of a total of 78 gave D. A. Stewart (liberal), 3,271; R. L. Richardson (independent), 2,162; James Toombs (conservative), 1,514.

At midnight 72 polls gave Stewart 3,213; Richardson, 2,172; and Toombs, 1,522. The result is just about what was expected, although Richardson was expected to give Stewart a close chase. The majority of Richardson's supporters are still of the belief that he would have been elected had the vote not been split by Toombs entering the field. Liberals naturally are elated. Conservatives are not saying anything, although they don't like the idea of their candidate losing his deposit.

MAIDEN SPEECHES IN SENATE.

Senators Beique and Thompson Made Favourable Impressions.

(Special to the Montreal Star.)

Ottawa, Feb. 18.—In the Senate yesterday afternoon, Hon. F. L. Beique moved the adoption of the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne. He made a most favourable impression on the Senate, both in his speech in French, as well as in English. In the course of his remarks, which only occupied some fifteen minutes in all he touched on the advantages which had arisen from the construction of the C. P. R. and the good which he anticipated from the Canadian exhibits at Buffalo and Glasgow. He went largely into the development of trade and warmly advocated the appointment of more commercial agents in foreign lands.

Hon. F. P. Thompson seconded the motion, dealing with the paragraphs of the speech seriatim. He spoke clearly and well.

Sir Mackenzie Bowell complimented both speakers on their utterances, and thought them additions to the speaking power of the Senate. Before dealing with the speech, he paid kindly testimony to the worth of those Senators who had departed this life during the recess. He then spoke at great length on the omissions from the Speech, dealing particularly with the fast Atlantic service, the Pacific cable and the third contingent. He attacked the trade figures quoted by Mr. Beique and alluded at great length to the differences of opinion existing among the members of the Cabinet, charging that when they were discussing matters they fought like blazes.

Hon. R. W. Scott answered, paying a tribute to the departed senators and to Lord Dufferin. He was answering Sir Mackenzie point by point, when it being six o'clock he moved the adjournment of the debate.

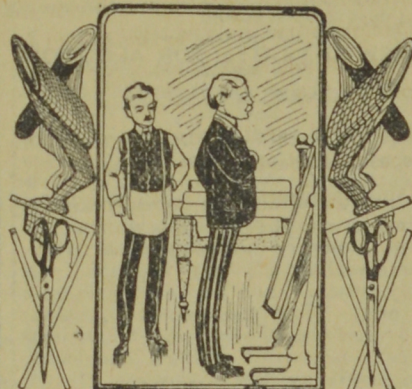
