BURIED HIM ALIVE.

WILL PROTECT THEMSELVES.

Richmond, Va., Feb. 19.—As the result of several attempts at criminal assault on well-known women in the town of Vinton, near Roanoke, Va., a "ladies' gun club" has been formed. The rules of the club require every member to carry a pistol in plain view and to learn how to use it accurately.

The matter had been under discussion several weeks. On Saturday night Mrs. David Powell went out into the hall at her own home in Vinton and lighted a match. A man blew it out, grabbed her arm and wrenched it. She screamed and the man fled. That settled the question, and the club was organized yesterday.

HOBSON TO RETIRE. (Special to Daily Herald.)

Washington, Feb. 19.—In accordance with a message from the President, Senator Gallinger has introduced a bill providing for Naval Constructor Richmond T. Hobson's transfer to the retired list. The message recites the history of Mr. Hobson's eye troubles, and concludes as follows: "In consideration of the foregoing, but especially of the gallant service rendered by Mr. Hobson in the sinking of the Merrimac, in the harbor of Santiago, during the recent war with Spain, I recommend the enactment of a suitable measure for his retirement."

NO USE NOT VOTING.

Ontario Government Can Defeat Any Such Action by Prohibitionists at General Election.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Toronto, Feb. 19.—The Globe indicates editorially what line may be taken to prevent the conditions attached to the prohibition vote from causing abstention from the polls at the next provincial election, a procedure which "cannot be justified on high grounds, leaving out of the question the interests of the temperance cause. It would be easy," says the Globe, "for the Government, and we have no idea what its intention is, to defeat this by providing that should the vote at the next general election be smaller than the vote cast in 1898, then the basis of the referendum should be the vote of 1898. We have no idea that the Government intend taking such a course, but it would be perfectly legitimate for it to do so if there was any attempt to prevent the obtaining of a full expression of opinion by the method suggested in some quarters."

LEASE EXECUTED.

Governor Snowball Has Rented the Beckwith House

AND WILL OCCUPY IT ON MARCH 1ST.

The Bargain Was Closed This Morning.

MR. BECKWITH TO RECEIVE \$500 PER ANNUM FOR HOUSE AND FURNITURE.

The lease of the commodious residence of Harry Beckwith, on University Avenue by Lieutenant Governor Snowball, was executed this forenoon, and His Honor and family will occupy it on or about March 1st. The lease is for one year, with the right of renewal at the expiration of that time. Mr. Beckwith is to receive a rental of \$500 per annum, which amount is to include the use of a portion of the furniture now in the house.

R. S. Barker, His Honor's private secretary, now has the key of the house in his possession and will set men at work immediately making what repairs are necessary, and he will also have the place renovated and repainted. Some additional furniture will be installed before the family take possession.

His Honor and daughter, Miss Francis Snowball, who have been here since Monday making arrangements for securing an official residence, left for home by the Canada Eastern this afternoon.

Lieutenant Governor Fraser was the last chief magistrate to reside in Fredericton, occupying Farraline Place as an official residence up to the time of his death in 1896. Sir Leonard Tilley, during the greater part of his last term of office resided in St. John.
