For Tourist Travel.

The Fredericton Tourist association at a meeting last evening decided to petition the city council for a grant of \$250 to assist the association in making known the advantages of Fredericton from a tourist standpoint. Last year the council voted the association \$150 for this purpose, and the reason given for not making the grant larger, was that the application for assistance had been made too late to allow the amount to go into the assessment. The association is therefore taking time by the forelock this year.

Wolves in New Brunswick.

A few days ago The Herald published an item which stated that three grey wolves had been seen at Royal Road by Henry and Samuel Currie. The St. John papers a few days later announced that two of these animals had been seen by a King's county farmer near his home. Now comes word from Rusiagornish, Sunbury county that a pack of the savage brutes were seen a few days ago by Edward Carey and followed him almost to his home. It is beginning to look as if the much dreaded wolf was once more getting a foothold in New Brunswick.

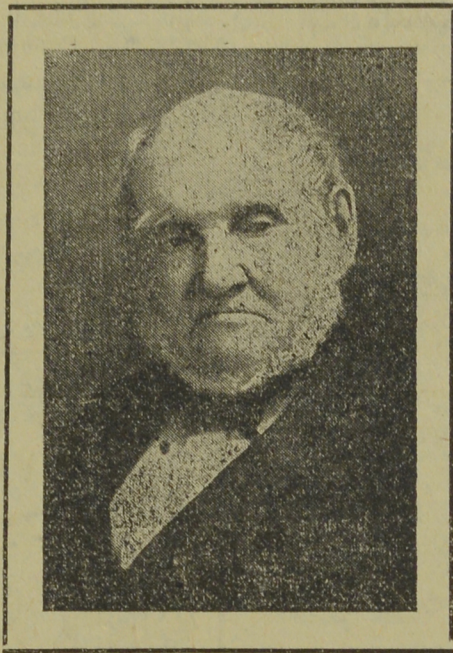
Will Remove to St. John.

MIRAMICHI TREE CLIMBER.

How a Witty Lumberman Worked a Game on Daniel Lynch

Henry Braithwaite is a great climber. Some years ago he and Arthur Pringle put in a winter trapping on the Petapedia, a branch of the Restigouche in Quebec. They went into a wilderness absolutely strange to them, and by climbing trees, taking the bearings of distant landmarks by compass, and following out the directions thus determined, they laid out trapping lines and soon became familiar with the country. You couldn't lose Henry if you dropped him from a balloon on the east side of Hudson Bay. He would climb a tree and get his bearings in a few minutes.

Dan Lynch, one of the greatest lumber cruisers in New Brunswick, is also a tree climber. When he sees timber he never knows it is time to make for camp. One day last winter Dan was out looking for spruce over towards the Gulgawak, and had Jack Spencer along with him. About half past two in the afternoon, when there was not more than an hour of good daylight left, Lynch clapped on the climbing irons and went up a big white spruce. What he saw from the treetop pleased him greatly, and he called down: "Jack, watch there where I throw this club." Down came the stick in the direction of a newly discovered bunch of standing timber. Spencer who had an eye to comfort, noticed with displeasure that the direction of the find lay far from the camp, and he knew Lynch's enthusiasm might keep them out all

night. So, while Lynch clambered down, he picked up the stick and carried it where it would do the most good. When Lynch reached the ground he carefully took the bearing of the stick, and the two men started to the trackless woods. An hour later they came to the dooryard of Manly Black's camp. Dan stopped and eyed Spencer with sorrow and reproach. "Jack," said, he sadly, "I never throwed that club this way, never in the world."
