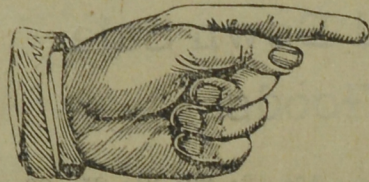

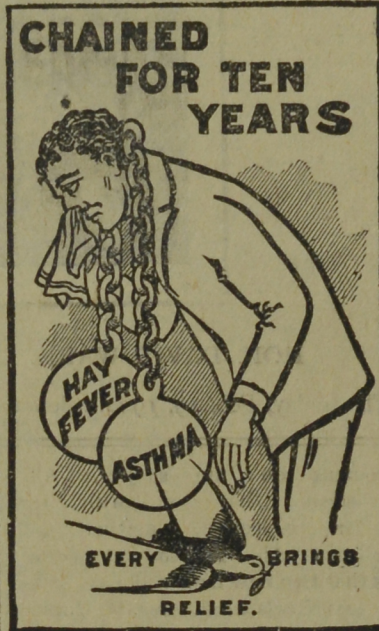
One of the oldest buildings in Quebec city, Alford's old house on John street, occupied by Mr. Lyons, baker, was destroyed by fire on Sunday night.
