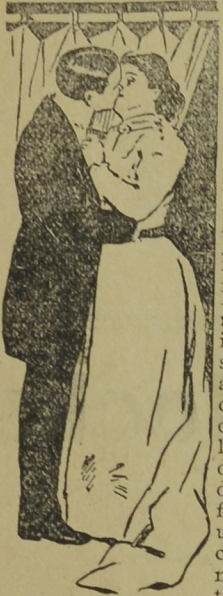


LOVE

When Dryden Died.

One more literary landmark is being wiped off the map of London. This time it is the house in Gerrard street, Soho, in which Dryden died. Even now the pickaxe is at work. The street itself, from which this monument is vanishing, has historical associations. One house, now used as a telephone exchange, had Edmund Burke as a tenant. Lord Mohun, the duellist, and Lord Lytton lived in Macclesfield House, the residence of Lord Gerrard, afterward Earl of Macclesfield. At the "Turk's Head," too, the famous Literary Club used to hold its meetings, frequented by Dr. Johnson, Sir Joshua Reynolds, Burke and other great figures. In a little while, however, Gerrard street will be like any other London thoroughfare, a thoroughfare and nothing more.

Mr. Herbert Gladstone.

Mr. Herbert Gladstone, who was recently married, was generally regarded as a confirmed bachelor, which is scarcely surprising, because his tale of years is not far short of half a century. For over twenty years he sat in the House of Commons, but, thanks to his devotion to physical culture, those years have passed very lightly over his head, and his figure is still quite youthful. Overshadowed as he is by the memory of a great historical figure, he could scarcely expect to achieve much in politics, but he has proved himself a useful administrator, and showed a certain amount of originality in accepting the post of Chief Whip, after he had served as First Commissioner of Works. Mr. Akers-Douglas, on the other side of the house, precisely reversed this procedure. The Paget family, into which Mr. Herbert Gladstone married, is one of those English commoner families which are too proud to claim any connection with the ennobled Pagets, whose head is the Marquis of Anglesey. Sir Richard Horner Paget, Mr. Gladstone's father-in-law, is a Somerset squire pure and simple. He sat for something like thirty years as a Somersetshire member in the House of Commons, and when he retired in 1895 he was made a Privy Councillor. He had been made previously a Baronet, and owns a fair amount of land for a Baronet, some 4,000 acres among the Mendip Hills, where the famous Cranmore Tower is a mark for miles round. The marriage between Mr. Gladstone and Miss Paget is one more proof of the amenities of English politics. The Right Hon. Sir Richard Horner Paget was always one of the "Old Gang," and got his reward for services to the party which his son-in-law spends his life in combating.

The Oldest Living General.

After the Duke of Luxemburg, the Grand Duke of Mecklenburg-Strelitz—a brother-in-law of the Duke of Cambridge—who recently celebrated the sixtieth anniversary of his enrollment in the Russian army, is now the oldest living general. He is, moreover, the third oldest sovereign in Europe, the Duke of Luxemburg being the oldest and King Christian the second oldest. He was eighty-two on the 17th of October and has for many years been totally blind. He is a great favorite of King Edward and spent some time at Homburg with him last month.

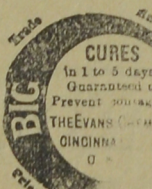
