REV. C. B. WELTON

Former New Brunswick Clergyman in Difficulty.

We find the following in the Boston Globe:

"New York, Jan. 27.—Unless members of his flock raise \$25 within a week to pay his fine, Rev. C. B. Welton, pastor of the First Baptist church of Rockville Center, L. I. will be sent to jail. He says that he is without funds to pay the fine.

Mr. Welton was recently examined in supplementary proceedings brought because of his failure to pay \$500 borrowed from a woman who now lives in Nova Scotia. He was ordered not to collect \$111 due him for his services as pastor. In defiance of this order, he told his landlady to collect a part of the sum for his board, and because of this he was fined \$25.

Mr. Welton admits borrowing \$500, but says he has no money with which to pay the debt."

[Mr. Welton was formerly stationed in this province, but he withdrew from New Brunswick after some trouble he and his brother, Rev. Sydney Welton, had in connection with insurance cases.]

THE LORD'S DAY ALLIANCE.

The General Secretary to Visit Fredericton.

The Rev. J. G. Shearer, B. A. General Secretary for Canada of the Lord's Day Alliance is to visit Fredericton, spending Sunday next, the 2nd of Feb. in our city. Sunday-morning he will preach in St. Paul's church, in the evening in the Baptist church, and will address a union mass meeting at a place to be named later. His subject at the mass meeting will be the "Battle of the Lord's Day in Canada." The Lord's Day Alliance was organized in 1895 to resist various serious outbreaks of Sunday labor, business and public pleasure. It is only within the last two years, however, since the appointment of the general secretary that the movement has become Dominion wide as an organization.

It has now no less than 240 local branches scattered over all parts of Canada. It does not aim at interfering with personal liberty, nor to coerce religious life in the observances of the Sunday, but rather to preserve to the whole community the right to the full enjoyment of the day. Mr. Shearer has recently visited Sackville, Dorchester, Campbellton, Dalhousie, Bathurst, Newcastle, Chatham, Richibucto and Moncton. In all these places as well as St. John, St. Stephen local alliances have been organized. He is visiting Sussex, St. Andrews and Woodstock this week, and will hold a Provincial Convention at St. John on February 4th and 5th.

The Sportsmen's Show.

Surveyor General Dann is in the city today making arrangements to forward the New Brunswick exhibit to the Boston Sportsmen's Show. It is understood that all of the best specimens of mounted game animals belonging to the Crown Land Office will be taken, and there will probably be some moose and caribou heads sent from St. John. W. H. Allen, the well known guide of Penniac, has offered to build a portable log cabin, to form part of the exhibit, and it is understood that his offer has been accepted by the Surveyor General. The members of the Fredericton Tourist Association are co-operating heartily with the Surveyor General in the movement, and the indications are that the exhibit from this province will be first class in every particular. The C P R authorities are to provide a 72 foot car in which to transport the exhibit.
