The value of goods entered for consumption at the port of Fredericton, during the month just ended amounted to \$34,122 and the duty collected was \$2,921.91. For November, 1901, the imports amounted to \$37,290, and the duty to \$2,669.29.

There was deposited in the Dominion Savings bank here during the month of November the sum of \$15,353, and the withdrawals during the same period amounted to \$9,713.16. The balance in favor of depositors on November 30th was \$935,786.63.

His other root and grain crops were equally heavy. Mr. Parent besides having a large and productive high land farm, is also the owner of one of the Coack Islands.

NOVEMBER WEATHER.

Some Interesting Figures from the Meteorological Office

Dr. Harrison, meteorological agent in Fredericton, has placed the following facts regarding November weather at the Herald's disposal.

Hours of bright sunshine, 81, being 18 hours less than last November, and 12 hours less than the average of 21 years.

Mean temperature, 35 degrees, being 3

degrees higher than the average of 29 years.

Highest temperature, 57 degrees on November 2nd.

Lowest temperature, 14 degrees on the 26th.

Rain and melted snow 1.8-10 inches, 3.10 of an inch less than the average of 29 years.
