IMPERIAL DEFENCE.

Col. Denison, of Toronto,
on His Favorite
Theme

SPEAKS AT THE COLONIAL IN-
STITUTE BANQUET, LONDON.

Great Enthusiasm Aroused.

London, May 2.—The most interesting episode of the last 24 hours has been the breath of fresh air at that Imperial function, the annual banquet of the Colonial Institute in Whitehall rooms. The speaking began after 9 o'clock, and was perfunctory for two hours. Lord Grey as chairman opened the proceedings quietly, and there was nothing of exceptional interest. The Hon. Henry Copeland, representing New South Wales, suggested that the three sons of the Prince of Wales should have the titles of Princes of Canada, of Australia and of South Africa, and the daughter, Princess of New Zealand. Lieut.-Gen. Sir Leslie Rundle asserted that a good feeling had been brooded about between the colonial contingents and the British army. The Lord Chancellor talked about the utility of Parliament, and Lord Grey paid a tribute to the unselfish idealism of the late Mr. Cecil Rhodes.

It was not until 11 that real interest was created by the response of Colonel Denison to the toast of the United Empire. He was only on his feet five minutes, but he carried the representative audience of 240 colonials with him. He said that the empire was not united, that it was neither united nor organized for defence, and that the approaching conference at the coronation would be the most important event in the history of the British race. Canadians thought that the empire should be combined for defence and trade. War might come at any moment. What Canada would propose at the conference would be to put a tariff of 10 per cent. on all foreign goods at every British port, not for protection, but for Imperial defence. This would help to protect the trade of the empire with every other British port, and would stop the merciless competition and commercial war from foreign nations.

If this tariff were put on and free trade established within the empire, the United Kingdom ought to be willing to make sacrifices. Premier Seddon of New Zealand certainly would be with Canada, and probably Australia also in presenting this proposition.

Col. Denison's policy excited murmurs of dissent at first, but was applauded with great vigor at the close as a practical sequel to the tax on grain and flour.

YOUNG'S DESCENDANTS.

They Number More Than 1000—Planned
to Have Them Meet in Reunion
at Salt Lake.

Salt Lake, Utah, May 2.—Arrangements were made yesterday for the first reunion of the descendants of the late Brigham Young, president of the Mormon church. For the first time founder of the church was announced by the family.

There were 26 children who survived Mr. Young. From these sprang 294 grandchildren and there are 742 great-grand children. These total over 1000 descendants of a man who has died since the civil war. They are scattered all over the world, some by change of residence, some on missions and others travelling.

Despite the great number of his children, the descendants say that Pres. Young knew them all by name. "He always carried sugar in his pocket to give us. He loved children."

This does not agree with a story that is currently believed. Just before he died Pres. Young met there little boys on the street smoking cigarettes. He stopped them and asked, "Don't you know you are committing a sin to smoke? Didn't your father ever tell you this was wrong?"

"Why, pa," chimed in the three boys, "don't you know us?"

The young family denies this story.

The Canadian Pacific Railway Company's Telegraph will, within the next five weeks, string no less than 1,900 miles of new wire in different portions of Canada. The company has contracted for 200 tons of No. 9 copper wire and the same is now being drawn by a Montreal house. The new lines, which will be strung for the purpose of increasing the present facilities, will extend from Montreal to St. John, N. B., from Halifax to Sydney, and from Montreal to Sault Ste Marie. The work on the 1,900 miles was started at Sydney, Thursday, and four other gangs will follow at different points. It is expected that the whole will be strung on poles and in operation in the course of five weeks.

BRITONS WILL CELEBRATE.

Great Gathering Planned at
Boston in Honour of the
King's Coronation.

CANADIAN TROOPS EXPECTED.

Including the Duke of York's Hussars
of Montreal and the 48th Highlanders
of Toronto.

Boston, Mass., May.—The Coronation of King Edward VII. of England will be celebrated in Boston June 17, by people of British descent resident in the city and surrounding places. Among the organizations that are taking an active part in formulating plans are: British Charitable Society, Victorian Club, Sons of St. George, Independent Order of the Sons of St. George, Uniformed Rank of the Sons of St. George, Daughters of St. George, Canadian Club, British Naval and Military Veterans' Association, Manchester Unity, I. O. O. F., Order of Scottish Clans, Caledonian Club, Calthness Association, United Order of Orangemen, Welsh Associates, British Officers' Association, Maritime Provincial Association and Ladies' Auxiliary, Ladies' Auxiliary of the Scottish Clans and others from several cities and towns in the State.

Henry W. Patterson, president of the Canadian Club, is permanent chairman, and Captain Thomas Stokes, of the British Naval and Military Veterans' Association, is secretary.

Mechanics' Building has been secured for the occasion, and arrangements have been for a grand military pageant of Canadian troops. The "Kilty" band of the Forty-eight Highlanders of Toronto, the only band of the kind on the continent, will parade with the Duke of York's Hussars from Montreal and the Sixty-third Regiment of Foot from Toronto. Following these in procession will be the several organizations, each with its own band.

At the hall the "Kilty" band will give a concert, and the soldiers will give an exhibition drill. Sir Richard Cartwright, one of the most prominent speakers of Canada, and Senator McMillan, of the United States Congress, will address the assembly.

There is already a great demand expressed for tickets by the British residents in and around Boston. Within the radius represented there are more than 200,000 people who were natives of England or Canada or the descendants of such.

TWO CORSETS GIVEN EACH.

Justices of the Supreme Court Receive
Them as Exhibits in a Patent
Infringement Case.

Washington, May 2.—Every member of the supreme court except Justice Gray, who is ill, received yesterday samples of "straight-front" corsets and many samples of garter holders that go with the corsets. During the afternoon the clerk's office looked like a corset shop. There were pink and blue, lavender and white, black, red and yellow corsets, and the garter holders ran the gamut of color.

The case is that of Paramor vs Taylor, and is a suit for the infringement of a "straight-front" corset patent. Each justice was given samples of the styles made by the appellant and the respondent, to accompany the briefs filed by the lawyers.

The justices will examine the toggery and decide. Most of the justices are married, and they looked at the samples with becoming gravity and directed their messengers to take care of them.

Chief Justice Fuller drew a bewitching red corset, Justice Harlan's was blue, and Justice McKenna's pink.

ZOLA WON'T TALK.

No Longer Occupies Himself With the
Dreyfus Affair, and Knows Nothing
About Mr. Hughes Leroux's
Statements.

Paris, May 3.—The correspondent of the Gazette yesterday called at the residence of M. Zola to interview him regarding the statement of M. Hughes le Roux in Chicago that M. Zola had seen a paper signed by ex-Captain Dreyfus, in which the latter admitted the charges made against him, and that M. Zola and Dreyfus are no longer friends. M. Zola declined to see the

correspondent, but he sent word by the concierge that he no longer occupies himself with the Dreyfus affair. He added that he knew nothing of M. Le Roux's statement and would say nothing about it. He absolutely refused to see journalists, French or foreign. The correspondent then saw a lawyer who appeared in the Dreyfus case, and who is qualified to speak in Dreyfus' name. He authorized the correspondent to give the fullest denial to M. Le Roux's statement, which he declared was false in every word. The correspondent expects to get a statement from Dreyfus himself today.

WESTERN RECRUITS.

Nearly Six Hundred Men Left Winnipeg
For Halifax.

Winnipeg, May 2.—The western contingent of recruits for Canada's third contribution passed through Winnipeg yesterday, bound for Halifax, and South Africa. They were joined here by nearly 200 men, making the party nearly 600 strong leaving Winnipeg. Despite a heavy rain, a hearty send-off was given the men. From Brandon and Portage Towns came 24 men. In the next car were 11 from Kamloops; Rossland sent 34, while Nelson, B.C., men numbered 25; Calgary sent 38 in all, while 14 men from Edmonton, 11 from Regina and 3 from Moosemin occupied the next carriage. The Pincher Creek men were about the best looking on the train, and had decorated their carriage with flags and bunting. There were over thirty men from Pincher Creek. Victoria and Vancouver men each had a car to themselves.

SAVED BABY BROTHER.

Hero of 14 in Indiana Shoots Eagle
Within Few Inches of Prey.

Bourbon, Ind., May 3.—Howard Staley, a boy of 14, is the hero of the hour here. Yesterday morning he was cleaning a shotgun in the rear of his country home and watching a little baby brother playing in a sand pile a short distance away, when a huge bird was noticed to be soaring round and round above him.

Thinking it a hawk he loaded the gun to get a shot at it. This action was none too soon, for the bird made a swoop for the baby and just as its claws were within a few inches of the child. Howard emptied both barrels at the eagle. The bird, seriously wounded, showed fight, but the boy shot again, killing it.

It was found to be a gray eagle weighing 12 pounds and measuring 7 feet 2 inches from tip to tip. This is the first of its kind ever seen here.

TRIBUTE TO DR. INCH

The Efficient and Popular Superintendent of Education.

The Mt. Allison Argosy for April has the following sketch of the superintendent of education:—

Dr. Inch, like President Allison, comes of the sterling Scotch Irish stock which counts for so much in the history of modern times, particularly, perhaps, on this side of the water. He is a native of Queen's Co., N. B., and was born in 1835. Coming to Sackville a boy of nineteen, he taught in the old Male Academy for ten years, taking his college course at the same time, and graduated in 1864. In the same year he was appointed Principal of the Ladies' College, as it was then called, and filled the position with distinguished success till 1878, when he succeeded Dr. Allison in the Presidency of what was then Mt. Allison Wesleyan College. During his incumbency of this post he faithfully and successfully grappled with all the various problems of finance and business inherent in positions of this nature, and proved himself an administrator of a high order.

Above all it is to his wisdom and energy that we owe our beautiful Centennial Hall. Nor did he keep his eye fixed on the temporalities alone; but as an accurate, thoughtful and painstaking teacher, as a potent moulder of character, as an insistent disciplinarian he made it abundantly apparent that for him the invisible, intangible matters with which the educator has to do were after all the realities of his professional life—the things which though unseen are yet eternal.

After thirteen years spent in the Presidential office, Dr. Inch was in 1891 appointed Superintendent of education for his native province, and in this capacity, it is needless to say, has displayed as an administrator the same ability that has characterized the rest of his career. The educational interests of the Province are thoroughly safe in his hands. He is not the victim of fade. He discharges the important routine duties of his office with carefulness and good judgment, and on public occasions by his weighty and pregnant utterances commands the respect and attention of all. Dr. Inch is yet in the prime of life and may reasonably look forward still to many years of usefulness. That this may be so, that his last days may be his best days, is the sincere wish of all those connected with the management of the Argosy.

MEDALS FOR CORONATION.

First Lot of a Big Order Shipped to
England From United States.

New York, May 3.—The Attleboro firm of jewelers, Charles M. Robbins will ship to England next week 3,000 medals in gold, silver and bronze, the first of a consignment of 40,000 medals of various grades which have been ordered by King Edward to commemorate his coronation. When the order is filled in June, the loyal subjects of the King will receive them. Their are eight varieties of medals. They will be given to Royal visitors, diplomatic representatives, members of the consular service and down through the lists, even to some of the soldiers and sailors. The medals are about the size of half a dollar. On one side are profile portraits of the King and Queen, both crowned. The inscription on the outer edge gives their names, dates of King's birth, his accession and coronation. On the reverse side are the Royal arms with the arms of the King and his various titles. Each medal is enclosed in a fine leather case.
