Yukon Navigation Closed

The steamer Amur, from Skaguay, which recently arrived at Victoria, B. C., reports that the Yukon has been frozen solid and the steamer Lafrance was caught and held in the ice coming down near Minto. She will remain there all winter, and fears are expressed that she may be crushed by the ice. The steamers Wilburn Cummin, Thistle and Eleanor, which reached White Horse on November 4, were the last in service. The first stage from White Horse reached Dawson on November 9, after six days' travel, and the first stage from Dawson was due at White Horse on Monday.

A Dawson despatch says that Mail-carrier Eli Yerreau left Dawson on Tuesday morning, October 28, with 500 pounds of lower river mail in a canoe. He was caught in an ice jam six miles below the mouth of Forty-Mile; his canoe was crushed and all the mail lost. Yerreau narrowly escaped with his life.

BIG GAME NOTES.

Adam Moore Has Had a Successful Season on the Tobique

Adam Moore, the celebrated guide and trapper of Scotch Lake, returned home yesterday from the Tobique woods, having concluded his hunting operations for the season. Mr. Moore and his son, John, who is associated with him, have put in seventy seven days guiding since the season opened, and in that time have had out eleven American sportsmen, the majority of whom came from the Middle West. Their total bag of the season amounted to seven moose, seven caribou, two deer and two bear. All the moose were of good size, the largest having an antler spread of 54 inches.

Mr. Moore says that the season now drawing to a close has been one of the most successful for big game in the history of the Tobique region, and estimates that 55 moose heads have been taken out by American sportsmen since the middle of September.

Mr. Moore's last party was a Mr. M. F. Westoner, of New York, who got his moose and caribou.

F. L. Peters, of New York, arrived in the city by the noon train today en route to the Little Southwest Miramichi, where he will hunt big game during the next fortnight under the guidance of the veteran Henry Braithwaite.

C. H. Trilton, of London, Eng., who has been hunting big game on the Little South West Miramichi for the last three weeks with Guide Henry Braithwaite, returned to the city by the Canada Eastern this afternoon, and is a guest at the Barker. He enjoyed his trip very much and secured his full complement of big game, a moose and a caribou, the moose having an antler spread of sixty inches. He left both heads with Emack brothers to be stuffed and mounted. Mr. Trilton will leave tomorrow for New York, and will take passage by steamer the last of the week for England.

Mr. Braithwaite reports eight inches of snow in the lumber woods at the present time.

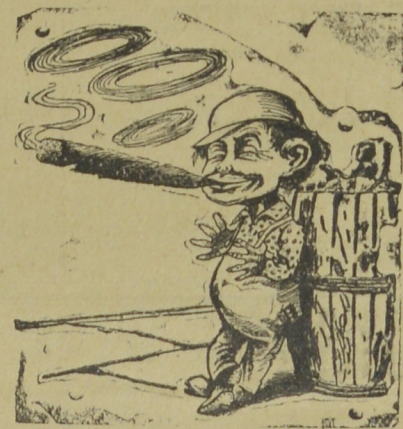

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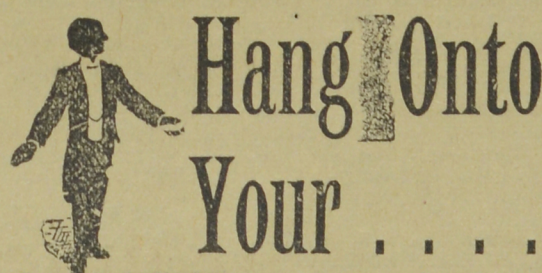
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
