THE BYE-ELECTION RECORD.

Since the general local election of 1899, there have been bye-elections in Gloucester, Kent, Westmorland, Albert, Kings (2) St. John County, York, Carleton (2) and Queens, eleven in all, and Mr. Hazen and his party only carried one of them, electing Mr. Fleming in Carleton. They had not the courage to even put up candidates except in Albert, Kings, Queens and once in Carleton. It is generally said that bye-elections fairly indicate the condition of public feeling towards a government, and if this is true the local administration have nothing to fear in the approaching general election. Even Carleton, the only county the opposition carried, afterwards elected Mr. Appleby, a government supporter, by acclamation, so that the government have practically carried every constituency opened since the general election.

Mr. Hazen has already shown his hand, indicated his policy, if it may be dignified by such a name, for the general contest, with his manifestos and written-to-order speeches; the people of nine of the sixteen constituencies in the province have pronounced in favor of the government in the bye-elections, and if the opposition leader can take any comfort out of this cold fact, he is capable of appearing more cheerful under defeat than even his devoted but misleading organ, the Sun.

A CLERGYMAN MISREPRESENTED.

It is a wicked thing to bear false witness against any man, to misrepresent his attitude, his actions, his words in any matter: it is perhaps worse to misquote and misrepresent the message which a preacher of the gospel bears to his people.

An example of the latter occurred Monday, when the Telegraph contained a Fredericton despatch, purporting to give an extract from Rev. Willard McDonald's sermon at St. Paul's church Sunday morning, on which the Telegraph founded an editorial paragraph in which the Rev. gentleman was chided for holding alleged peculiar views of Christ's mission on earth. The telegram was a tissue of falsehoods. Mr. Macdonald never made use of the language imputed to him, nor gave expression to ideas that could possibly be considered as indicating the belief of which he is accused. He never said that it was no part of our Saviour's mission on earth to heal the sick, and the person who took the trouble to send the Telegraph the mischievous and lying paragraph should be ashamed of his or her work. Contradiction of the statement was published in the Globe, and the Telegraph which made free to criticize Mr. Macdonald, should be fair enough to make the amende to him.

The Sun continues to make very wry faces over the defeat of its party in Kings county. It is most prolific in excuses, but the fact remains that the opposition campaign of slander failed in the constituency, and the Sun is again among the disappointed, defeated and dejected, along with Mr. Hazen, that alleged but mis-called astute political leader.

The Canadian reception at Niagara Falls tomorrow, to Prince Henry of Prussia, will be an informal affair, H. R. H. having expressed a wish that there be no guards of honor or salute. The Ontario Legislature will send some of its German members to present an address to the prince.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has introduced a bill providing for pensions in the N. W. M. Police.

The census returns of Newfoundland show a population of 216,615, and with Labrador the figures are 220,615, an increase of nine per cent. in ten years. There are 76,259 Roman Catholics, 72,650 Anglicans, and 52,276 Methodists and 6,500 Salvationists in the colony.

It is said that Whitelaw Reid, one of the special ambassadors from the United States to the King's coronation, has leased a London residence for six weeks at a rental of \$20,000. Mr. Reid is an editor and of course, can easily afford such a luxury.

There is nothing like good healthy agitation in public affairs. As a result of Kings Ward electors meeting and talking over civic matters, that ward now presents the largest number of candidates for aldermen of any ward in the city.

The Herald extends to the Governor, Mrs. Snowball and their family a cordial welcome to Fredericton. May they like this city so much that they will spend most of their time here during His Honor's term of office.

Prince Henry of Prussia visited Chicago yesterday and was accorded a wildly enthusiastic reception. At a ball in his honor last night, 2,000 guests were present, but the Prince did not dance.

The Dominion government will probably declare coronation day a public holiday throughout Canada.

Mayor Crockett had a bloodless victory.
