great relish, for having had nothing to eat since noon, all were very hungry.

A few minutes before nine o'clock the gang planks were pulled in and the troops gathered on deck to have a farewell look at the good old city of Quebec. As the steamer pulled out from the wharf the band of the 8th Rifles struck up Auld Lang Syne, the steam craft tooted their whistles, and the big guns of the citadel roared out a parting salute of fifteen guns. The crowds on shore set up a mighty cheer for the departing troops and from a government steamer anchored near by a number of sky rockets were exploded. It was certainly a rousing send off, and the exploding fireworks and the bright lights of the city, made a very pretty sight from the decks of the big liner.

The kit bags of the men and general baggage had been piled indiscriminately in a big heap on the main deck, and after the steamer got under way, the men made a rush to that part of the ship to search for their belongings. Every kit bag was stamped with the owner's regimental number, but in the confusion it took some time to sort their own and find what was wanted.

The non-commissioned officers of the contingent were assigned steerage quarters and canvas hammocks for the men have been swung between the decks. The sleeping accommodation is not exactly what the men would like but they recognize that the steamship authorities have done the very best they could for them under the circumstances and do not complain. The hammocks are swung from the ceiling and there is not very much space between them, so a person prowling about at night has to duck his head a good many times.

I cannot say that my first night's experience in a hammock on board ship was delightfully new, but it was new just the same and will not be forgotten in a hurry.

After leaving the wharf the Parisian moved slowly down stream for a distance of three miles and dropped anchor to await the turn of the tide. At one o'clock this morning she resumed her voyage but at five o'clock was obliged to lay off again on account of fog.

The troops were astir at an early hour and had breakfast while the steamer was lying at anchor. The steamship authorities unlike the individual who did the catering at the Levis camp, know how to take care of a big crowd at the table, and the men this morning were given no cause for dissatisfaction. The culinary arrangements are first class, and a staff of obliging waiters see to it that every man gets all that he can stow away. Indeed, the prospects look very bright for an exceedingly pleasant voyage.

A fog, so dense that it could almost be cut with a knife, somewhat restricted our view of the river and landscape this morning. It set in at daylight and showed no signs of dispersing until eight o'clock. Shortly afterwards a steamer of the Dominion Line, on her way to Quebec, loomed up on our port bow, and passed within easy hailing distance. Following in her wake came a number of sailing craft, probably fishing smacks. At nine o'clock the lofty hills on either side of the St. Lawrence could be made out and a few moments later the big anchor was hoisted and the engines were once more set in motion.

We are now scudding along at a fifteen knot clip, and if no more fog is encountered should be out into the gulf by sundown.

The troops are scattered about the main deck, smoking their pipes and apparently enjoying life to the fullest extent.

The Parisian is an old steamship but a good one, and it is said can make the trip from Quebec to Liverpool in eight days. She is about 5000 tons displacement, has a single screw propeller and is driven by two triple expansion engines. The long decks serve as an excellent promenade, and it does not look as if the men need suffer for want of a place for exercise.

The men of the contingent are traveling in pretty swell company, though the number of cabin passengers is not overly large.

His Excellency the Governor General is on board, so also is Sir Robert Bond, Premier of Newfoundland, Premier Tweedie of New Brunswick, Premier Peters of P. E. Island and other notables. Mrs. Tweedie accompanies her husband.

The saloon passengers have thus far stuck pretty closely to their state-rooms or the upper deck and the troops have not seen much of them, probably later in the voyage they will become more sociable. There are quite a number of ladies on board and they seem to appreciate the presence of the military men.

The Westminster Abbey choir is returning to England with us for the coro-

nation. They furnished the music at divine service held in the main cabin this forenoon.

The river for a time this morning was as smooth as a mill pond, but as we near the gulf it seems to be getting kind of rough. The steamer remains steady however, but it looks as if we were in for a rocking in the cradle of the deep before morning. We are to stop at Rimouski for passengers and mails, and I will send these few rambling notes ashore there.

Mr. Paul Kruger is not going back to South Africa. He couldn't bear the sight of the British flag flying from the parliament buildings at Pretoria.

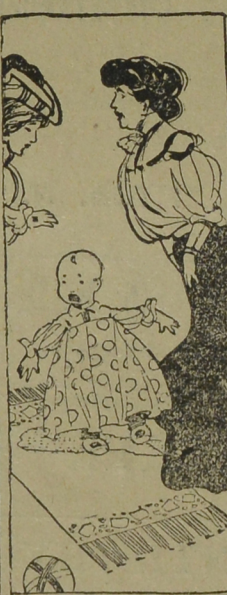
White Muslin Waists.

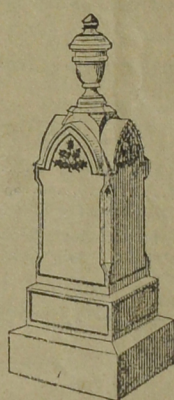
