THE G. I. PACIFIC.

First Regular Train Left Winnipeg Yesterday.

WINNIPEG, June 14.—The first through train on the Grand Trunk Pacific from Winnipeg to Scott, Saskatchewan, was put into service this morning, leaving the C.N.R. depot at 9.45, and consisting of four passenger coaches, combination baggage and mail car and official car 309. A party of officials left on the train on a trip of inspection. The coaches were all filled with passengers.

There was light frost in Manitoba this morning, but no harm was done.

Major Browne was drowned at Kit-saline, B. C., yesterday, while bathing. He was manager of the Vancouver Conservative campaign in the last federal election, and fifty-five years old.

Bush fires of a serious character are reported in Eastern Manitoba and Western Ontario. Along the Winnipeg River they are particularly bad. Fires are very close to Kenora, and unless there is rain soon the damage will be very heavy.

TREASURE FROM THE DEEP.

The office of a company in London is probably the last place where one would expect to find romance, unless, of course, a lady typist introduces it. But a London company with a romantic raison d'être is almost unthinkable. Yet London has a Sea Salvage Company whose object would have supplied excellent materials for a novel to the late R. L. Stevenson. The company has a capital of £200,000, several retired British admirals on its directorate, and its aim is to raise the seventeen Spanish galleons of the treasure fleet from America which were sent to the bottom of the Bay of Vigo in 1702 by the Anglo-Dutch fleet. The value of the treasure is estimated at any figure between £1,000,000 and £28,000,000. The instruments to be employed in raising this mine of wealth are the hydroscope and the elevator invented by Cavaliere Giuseppe Pico. By means of the former apparatus the galleons have already been located, and experiments with the latter have given the most encouraging results. The Spanish government has granted the company a concession which lasts till 1915, in consideration of a claim to 25 per cent. of all recovered.

Evangelizing Kingston.

Kingston, June 14.—An excursion of the Young Men's Fellowship arrived Saturday night with 500 people from Toronto. Members of the City Council and clergy met the visitors at the depot. At Market Square, Ald. McCann read an address of welcome. W. Robinson, Toronto, an old Kingston boy, and president of the Fellowship, replied. Afterwards the Victoria-Alexander choir sang the Glory song. Services in the churches yesterday were conducted by the members of the Fellowship, as also three large mass meetings, two in the city hall and one in Sydenham street church. A trip among the Thousand Islands is arranged for Monday.

Alberta's University.

Edmonton, Alta., June 14.—W. A. Kerr, M.A., Ph.D., of Toronto, and Harvard, has been named to succeed Prof. Alexander in the chair of modern languages in the University of Alberta.

Mr. J. A. McEachren, M.A., of Queen's, has been named for the chair of philosophy and Prof. Edwards will take charge of the department of engineering.

A large building program is outlined including residences for the students of both sexes, library and buildings for arts and science and laboratories.

TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS.

The Trades and Labor Council at Guelph want the fire brigade reorganized.

It is reported in London that another babe is expected soon in the Spanish royal family.

Lugien Reed, a farmer near Crosbyville, died suddenly after assisting in the evening milking, aged 60.

The body of Samuel Moran, who disappeared from Bancroft in April, was found on Saturday in Dutch Creek.

The annual convention of the Provincial Retail Merchants' Association will be held in Brockville Wednesday and Thursday.

James H. Williams, of Virden, Man., whose little girl died under Christian Science treatment, has been arrested for alleged neglect.

Mrs. Wm. Jacobs, an elderly woman who lived alone in her residence on the front road, one mile east of Brockville, was found dead seated in a chair.

When the Royal Colonial Institute expressed a wish to entertain the imperial press delegates they were told that the program was already complete.

On Friday afternoon the lifeless body of Mrs. Henry La Roche was found in an outbuilding on the 10th concession of Carden, near Lindsay. The coroner decided it was a case of suicide while temporarily deranged.

Berlin Boy Drowns.

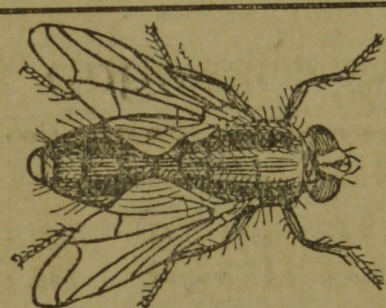
Berlin, June 14.—On Saturday afternoon Harry Huehnergard, the 14-year-old son of J. W. Huehnergard, instructor of an orchestra, was drowned in the Grand River at Riverside Park in Bridgeport. About 3 o'clock the lad, who was in a boat with three other boys, dived into the river. He was not missed until about two hours after when his clothes were found still lying on the bank. His companions then became alarmed and some employees of the Berlin Piano Co., who were picnicking at the park, commenced to search for him and the body was found at the bottom of the river at a depth of 12 feet, almost below where he had jumped in. The water was extremely cold five or six feet below the surface, and it is believed young Huehnergard took cramps and was unable to rise.

Fatal Building Collapse.

Detroit, June 14.—Traffic Manager William C. Hollar of the Peninsular Stove Co., was killed and four other men were injured, one of them fatally, when a section of the fifth floor of the storage warehouse of the plant suddenly collapsed and crashed down through to the ground floor.

Fourteen-Year-Old Aeronaut.

Los Angeles, Cal., June 14.—A large number of spectators were greatly impressed by a successful ascension to a height of 25 feet, achieved by 14-year-old Irving Barnes in an aeroplane of his own invention and construction.

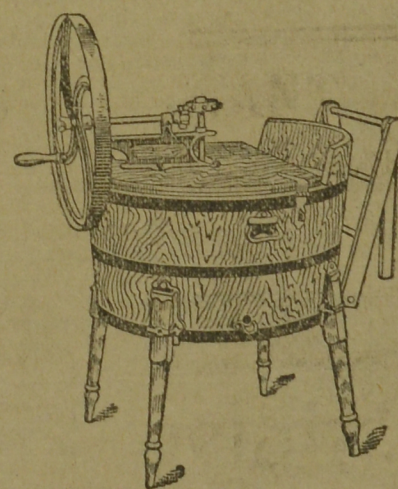
