## A DRAMATIC TURN.

### Banker Roy on Trial at St. John's, P. Q., Attempts to End His Life.

ST. JOHN'S, P.Q., May 26.—(Special)—The proceedings in connection with the prosecution against Hon. Mr. Roy have taken a dramatic turn. The court opened at 10 o'clock this morning, but the accused was absent, and the news ran rapidly around the room that he had attempted suicide. Finally, it was officially learned that the accused shot himself in the head about 7.30 this morning. The weapon he used was a .22 calibre revolver and the bullet entered the left temple, penetrating about one and a half inches. There were marks on the leg like powder burns. The wound is not regarded as dangerous. In fact medical men stated that it would not prevent his presence at the trial if bench warrants were issued by the court. The court—"Do you think the wound of such a nature as to so affect his mind as to prevent the accused coming to court?" "No." Dr. Tasse followed on the stand. He thought Mr. Roy in a condition to attend court. Lieutenant Col. Hibbard then applied for a bench warrant and this was granted by Judge Monett.

## THE NEW JUDGES.

### McKeown and Barry Appointed to the Bench Today—St. John Gets Exhibition Grant.

Ottawa, May 26.—(Special)—Hon. H. A. McKeown, K. C., of St. John, and Mr. J. H. Barry, K. C., of Fredericton, were today by order-in-council appointed judges of the Supreme Court Bench of New Brunswick.

Ottawa, May 25.—The government today examined the regulations for fisheries in international waters, prepared by Prof. Prince on behalf of Canada, and Dr. Jordan for the United States. It is understood that the regulations, as drafted, are satisfactory to Canada, and it approved by the Washington authorities, will be given effect on June 1 by simultaneous proclamation. Thomas H. Metcalfe, K. C., was today appointed to the high court bench of Manitoba.

There were no appointments of New Brunswick judges today, but recommendations for the appointment of Messrs. McKeown and Barry are in the privy council basket and may be reached tomorrow.

The maritime provinces will be subject to a scientific and resource examination this summer by several members of the geology survey staff. The investigation of the New Brunswick oil shales will be continued by Dr. R. W. Ellis, and he will extend his work to Nova Scotia and Gaspe.

Work on iron deposits in the Bathurst district will be continued by G. A. Young.

The coal formation of Cumberland county will be further examined by H. Fletcher.

There will be a continuation of the work of mapping the gold-bearing quartz of Nova Scotia by E. R. Fairbairn.

The industrial possibilities of the maritime provinces clay formations will be looked into by Joseph Kule and H. Reid.

The minister of agriculture will officially inform the directors of the St. John exhibition Association that they may count upon the \$50,000 grant for their exhibition in 1910.

There has been an order-in-council put through declaring that the exhibition vote for next year shall go to New Brunswick and Hon. Mr. Fisher has decided that St. John is to have the spending of the money. This decision has been reached chiefly because St. John is in the best position to accommodate the large crowd which may be expected at a Dominion show. The vote will not be placed in the estimates until next session but it will be available in ample time.

The annual meeting of the Royal Society of Canada was opened here today with a small attendance. The business was of a preliminary nature. This evening the president, Dr. Roy, delivered the annual presidential address, the subject being Canadian Copyright law.

Seven new members were added to the society. They are: Ernest Myrand, Quebec; Prof. C. W. Colby, McGill University; Prof. Frank Allan, Manitoba University; Prof. J. C. Fields, University of Toronto; Prof. D. Macintosh, McGill University; Prof. H. N. Tory, University of Alberta; and Prof. E. W. McBride, of McGill.

Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, Canadian minister of justice, and J. S. Ewart, K. C., sail for London Saturday to prepare the Canadian-Newfoundland case in the arbitration with the United States on the Atlantic fisheries before The Hague tribunal.

## THE DRIVES.

A number of men who have been on the drives up river, came down by the Gibson branch last evening. They report Randolph & Baker's drive out of the Blue river into the St. Francis, and that W. J. ## THE U. N. B. CLOSING.

### Venerable Institution of Learning Will Complete Another Successful Year Tomorrow.

### Order of Graduation and Winners of Prizes and Glass Distinctions.

The University of New Brunswick will complete another very successful year tomorrow afternoon, when a graduating class of seventeen young men and women will go forth from its classic halls to take their places in the life of the world.

The encyclical exercises will be held in the library, beginning at two o'clock, and are sure to attract a large number of people. Chancellor Jones will deliver the address in praise of the founders. Mr. F. L. Orchard is the valedictorian for the senior class, and Rev. E. B. Hooper of St. John will speak on behalf of the alumni society.

The final examinations were finished yesterday and the faculty held a meeting last evening, and arranged the order of graduation. Clifford T. Clarke bears the list of graduates with honors in Natural Science and Chemistry, with Arthur L. Dysart a close second.

Mr. Norman S. Fraser, of Covered Bridge, York county, is announced as the winner of Governor Tweedie's prize of \$50 awarded to the student making the best average on ordinary subjects in the senior year.

The City of Fredericton gold medal for chemistry and the Ketchum silver medal for engineering, have been won by Mr. Charles M. Hoar of Hopewell Cape, Albert County.

The Montgomery Campbell prize for proficiency in classes, has been won by Miss Frances L. Fish of New-castle.

Mr. Frank L. Orchard of this city has been awarded the Governor General's gold medal for proficiency in economics.

The Brydone-Jack memorial scholarship for physics goes to Miss Amy L. Sharpe of Woodstock.
