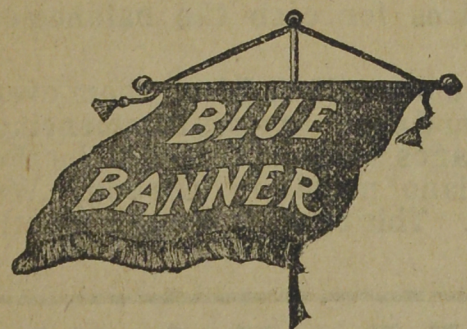

**A BUILDING BOOM.**

Several New Residences Being Erected in different parts of the City.

It looks as though considerable of a building boom would go on in this city during the coming summer.

New lots are being purchased in different parts of the city, and buildings are either in course of erection or will be erected in the next couple of months.

Mr. W. A. B. McLellan has begun the erection of a new residence on Charlotte street, above the corner of Regent street.

Mr. Charles Scott has purchased the Gooney property on the same block, and is erecting a house, which he will occupy during the early fall.

Mr. Thomas Feeney is making improvements to his property in the same vicinity.

On Waterloo Row, Lansdowne street, and the new streets Gray and Winslow, a number of lots have been purchased by local parties, and some buildings are to go up during the summer.

Mr. C. W. Whelpley, who lately purchased the Smith property on the corner of Waterloo Row and Shore street, is having the building remodelled, and it will be occupied by Mr. W. T. Chestnut, and also Mrs. A. R. Balloch and family, who will remove from Kingscler.

Mr. J. Stewart Neill has completed his handsome new residence on Waterloo Row, and is now occupying it.

Mrs. Alonzo Barker is erecting a new house on the corner of University avenue and Lansdowne streets, on a lot purchased from the Shore estate.

Dr. W. H. Steeves, who on Tuesday purchased a lot on Lansdowne street, will begin the erection of a new residence in July next.

Ex-Ald. Moses Mitchell has a lot above the residence of Mr. Harry Chestnut, Waterloo Row, on which he will probably put a house during the summer. Several local parties are looking at lots, and in some cases securing options on property in this section of the city.

The attention of members of the city council has been called to the fact that the new street named after Lord Grey was given to the city by property owners in that vicinity, and as it has not cost the civic treasury anything so far, it would be a good idea for the council to expend a few dollars towards making it passable. The city plans show a number of desirable building lots in this locality. The street runs parallel with Lansdowne street, and is nicely situated.

Another new street in that locality which runs parallel with Waterloo Row, is Winslow street.

The Fraser building on the old Aberdeen mill site, formerly a boarding house connected with the mill, has been remodelled by Contractor Mitchell into a tenement house.

Mention has already been made of the handsome new brick building with stone front, to be erected by the Bank of New Brunswick on Queen street. Workmen are now engaged preparing the site for the foundation, and when the building is completed, the bank will have one of the most modern and handsome business establishments in the city.

**Storm Signals.**

Washington, May 25.—Flashing around the world by wireless telegraphy warnings of approaching storms and other disturbances of the elements is one of the latest international projects. Another is the proposition to equip the vessels of all nations with uniform storm signals. These are the leading problems to be threshed out at a conference of distinguished meteorologists of the principal nations to be held in London on June 21 next.

Brockton, Mass., May 25.—With his marriage to Miss Florence Adams of Elmwood, arranged for yesterday afternoon and with a home furnished, ready for occupancy, Charles B. Russell of this city yesterday took his life by shooting. He was 24 years old.

**60,000 at Aeroplane Contest.**

Juvis, France, May 25.—Sixty thousand persons attended the aeroplane race meeting at the new aerodrome here Sunday. A high wind prevailed, and the contest was greatly marred thereby.

New York, May 25.—Vice-President Ogden of the Canadian Pacific declares that weather conditions have not injured the Canadian crops.

**Profit in Apples.**

A despatch from Vernon, B.C., says that sixty-five tons of apples have been taken from 161 trees at the Coldstream orchards there. At 43 pounds to the box, this would give a total of 3,023 boxes. This immense yield was of the variety known as Pewaukee, and as the same quality of fruit is retailing in the local stores at Vernon at \$1.25 a box, the returns from these two acres alone would be something over \$3,778, or \$1889 an acre gross.

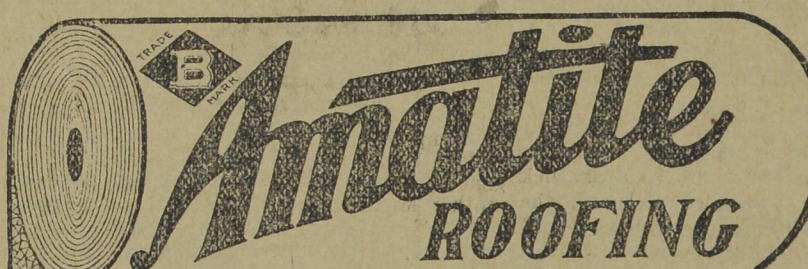

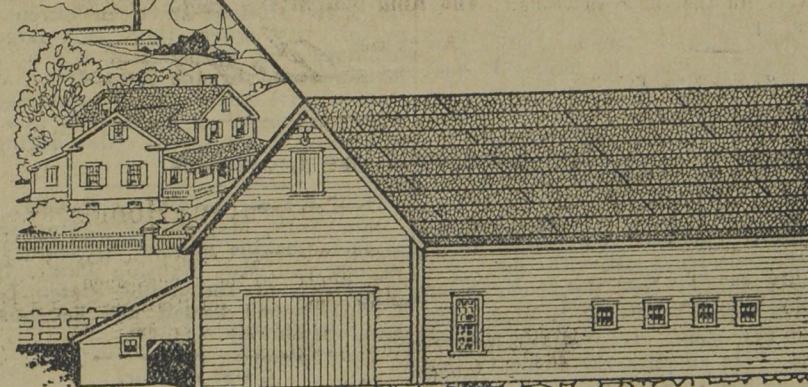
